


Breakages - and repairs



St Andrew's, Plymouth

There seems to have been a glut of equipment failures recently. At the Minster church in Plymouth, a slider broke while the ninth was being set at backstroke, causing it to go over the balance. This caused an injury to the youngster ringing it. He was rescued by emergency services using specialist equipment to lower him to the ground and then taken to hospital to treat a broken arm; the incident made the newspapers! On investigation it turned out that the slider was the only one in the tower that had not been painted and it was infested with woodworm. A check by the independent Diocesan advisors showed no other problems.

A visit by the bell advisors to Broadhembury identified a similar problem with woodworm on the slider to the third. Before anything

could be done about it this had also broken but resulted only in a couple of sore hands. It is unusual for sliders to break, and especially two within a short period of each other.

No sooner than the slider at Broadhembury had been replaced when the clapper on the treble failed. This was rather more expensive to fix!

Other places have had problem with bearings. At Crediton two of the bells were found to be shifting sideways in their bearings, causing one end of the headstock to rub against the bearing housing. These were sorted out and tightened up by local experts. However the clapper on the tenth has not fared so well. Following yet another failure of the supporting crown staple attempts are being made to replace the staples on the back bells with a different design. It is unlikely that this will be sorted out before the Guild AGM.

The tenth at Exeter Cathedral had been going badly for several months. On investigation the headstock and bell had also shifted and the headstock was rubbing against the bearing housing as at Crediton. It was suggested that it would be like 'ringing with the handbrake on'. The bell-hangers responded quickly and were able to lift each side of the bell

in turn from the H-frame to reposition the headstock. On examination the bearings were fairly badly worn, so the opportunity was taken to replace them both at the same time. Although the gudgeons that the bearings fit on are made to Imperial measurements (inches), a sleeve which converts this to the metric measurements used by the bearings and housings was reused.

The very next day, the bellhangers attended to the ninth bearing at St Mark's, Exeter. This bell had also been going badly for some time, and occasionally dropping for no apparent reason. In this case there was no suitable beam to lift from, and one bearing was very close to the wall; the bell was gently lowered from the headstock onto some bearers so that the headstock could then be turned 90 degrees to examine and remove the bearings. Both were found to be completely worn out — one was jamming where the 'cage' that holds the balls in place was broken and some balls were loose within it, and the other had completely disintegrated so that there was very little sign of the cage and some of the balls! Both were replaced as soon as suitable Imperial bearings could be sourced.

Finally, five leads into a quarter peal at Exeter Cathedral on Ascension Day, the tenth clapper sheared off just above the ball, where it is drilled to attach to the wooden shaft, in the same way that the eleventh clapper had failed a few months ago. However the old clapper had been kept and was replaced in the bell, so that ringing could continue as planned, especially for the Jubilee.

Safeguarding

I took over as Guild Safeguarding Officer at last year's AGM. Since then, my main task has been to update the Guild safeguarding policy. I have also set up a dialogue with Charlie Pitman who is the Diocesan Safeguarding Lead. I have recently had a couple of questions from Guild members which I outline below. Please contact me if you have any queries I can help with: safeguardingoficer@devonringers.org

Recent Safeguarding queries:

- Has there been any agreement or decision between the Diocese O: and the Guild regarding whether bell captains are required to do the Leadership Course?
- We would not expect tower captains to complete the Leadership module although, if they felt they were a significant contributor to steering the life of their church/PCC, they would be more than welcome. This perhaps could be a conversation with the local Incumhent
- I have an Enhanced DBS Certificate for my role as vice tower captain, and am someone who may be teaching young/vulnerable people to ring. When it was issued, I applied for a subscription to the annual update service, thinking this would make life easier in future. Each year I receive an email telling me the certificate will be updated unless I cancel the subscription. I have now had an email from the local parish safeguarding representative stating that the C of E will not allow automatic updates to be used, and that I must complete a new application every three years. This appears to be in contradiction to the statements in the C of E Practice Guidance: Safer Recruitment (2016). Is there more up-to-date guidance?
- There is a new Safer Recruitment and People Management Guidance document 2021 which replaces the 2016 version. It doesn't specifically state that the 'update' service cannot be used but, as it stands, the Exeter Diocese does not recognise the 'update' service, for a variety of reasons. Therefore, if a DBS is required for the purposes of Diocesan work, they would ask that you take the three year renewal approach for consistency.

Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund

A fairly quiet start to the year allowed our new Chairman and Secretary to get to grips with their roles. In my case this was with the support of all my fellow trustees, in particular the outgoing secretary, Ian Smith. Many thanks to you all.

As usual we held our first meeting of the year on the Monday of Holy Week. We had only one new request for a grant to discuss, this time from Huntshaw. A grant of £3,700 was agreed towards rehanging the three bells, one for swing chiming and all three to have electromagnetic hammers. Also, for the creation of trapdoors to allow access to the bells. Despite this I still came away from the meeting with twelve sizeable actions, making me realise just how much of my time was going to be needed if I was to make a success of my new role.

I am also delighted to confirm that two grants are likely to be paid out in the next few weeks for the rehanging and tuning of the bells at Cadbury and Milton Abbot, as both projects are now complete. This will see the fund paying out £15,000 of its committed funds in one month, almost as much as we paid out in the previous two years combined. I hope this shows that the effects of the Covid pandemic on bell restoration, and ringing, has finally come to an end.

I have also heard from Butterleigh who have confirmed the work required on the tower is now complete. They are now just waiting for a window in Taylor's schedule, where the bells have been stored whilst the work was underway, to return and rehang their three bells. Currently the earliest this will happen is mid-September but they are hopeful of an earlier completion.

It's been an interesting few weeks as secretary, with the need to revisit the amount of a grant offered due to a major change in the amount of work now planned at one tower. Another requesting a grant to work on the church tower itself rather than the bells was refused as it falls outside of our rules. Also, a new application being sent which will hopefully be back with me in time for our next meeting in November.

As you can see there is plenty happening in the world of bell maintenance and restoration so the need to keep raising funds remains. As ever, thank you to everyone who gives both time and money to help the Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund continue its work.

Obituaries Fr Christopher Delaney, Buckfast Abbey, 1932-2022



Fr Christopher passed away in the early hours of Sunday 8 May 2022, aged 89. He was born on 26 September 1932 in Bristol and had three sisters. He became a monk of Buckfast in 1950, when aged just 18, and was ordained priest six years later. He spent his time in parish work, firstly in Liverpool, then in Cardiff for 43 years.

A keen cyclist, he took several parties on cycling holidays to Lourdes and Switzerland, and cycled from Lands End to John O' Groats three times!

In the local Welsh press, Monsignor Joseph Boardman, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of Cardiff described Fr Christopher as 'quite a character and a wonderful priest, who was much loved across the community'.

Fr Christopher was not a member of the Guild, but was a great supporter of ringing at Buckfast Abbey and although he was unable to climb the tower any longer he always showed an interest in the ringing and visiting bands. He thoroughly enjoyed the bellringing festival organised by Geoff Pring held there a couple of years ago, and featured by being interviewed by the BBC for their *Spotlight* programme. He also took part in the Devon Ringers' carol service the last time it was held at Buckfast Abbey. Another television appearance saw him interviewed by Fiona Bruce on *The Antiques Roadshow*.

Fr Christopher's body was received into the Abbey prior to Vespers on Thursday 19 May and his Requiem Mass was held on Friday 20 May. Large numbers of people attended, including many from his former parishes in Liverpool and Cardiff.

May he Rest in Peace and Rise in Glory.

Alan faced illness in recent months unafraid and surrounded by his loving family and church community.

Alan and Gill both learnt to ring in Teignmouth for the Millennium, taught by Martin Dodd, and soon became members of the Guild. It became a passion he was to enjoy for the rest of his life. Alan was a founder member of the Teignmouth Bells Project (TBP). He, together with Gill raised a great deal of awareness, not to mention funds for ringing in Teignmouth and the Mid-Devon Branch. Alan was the current TBP Secretary and was working with other committee members until a recent operation in March. We all hoped for a return to health, which, sadly, was not to be.

Following an emergency hip operation during the Covid pandemic, Alan had stuck to ringing hand bells. He did not just ring hand bells, he led his own hand bell team. His and the band's performances were always the highlight of the Teignmouth Christmas Fayre. Light, bright, musical and fun. Always filled with the joy of Christmas.

His enthusiasm for all things ringing was passionate and supportive. Few can forget his ringing outings, which were always interesting mini adventures. Just what outings should be! He served on the Mid-Devon Branch committee and brought his very considerable intelligence and thoughtfulness to branch matters.

First and foremost Alan was a committed Sunday Service ringer. As far as we're aware he never rang a peal but a quick look on BellBoard reveals he rang the occasional quarter peal, the last of which was in 2014, alongside his friend and mentor Martin Dodd who was celebrating fifty years of ringing.

The Teignmouth band, like his many church bell ringing friends, will miss his gentle encouragement and calm positivity. He mentored many, and the Teignmouth band have benefitted greatly from his long years of support. It was always a pleasure ringing with Alan and we will all miss him very much.

It is understood there will be a private family cremation, followed by a thanksgiving service at a later date.

Many of you will know St Andrew's at Broadhembury and will have rung here with Pauline McKenzie – who featured in last month's issue of *Ringing Round Devon*. However, the bells have remained mostly silent for a few years. Through lockdown, a small team decided to bring them back into life – even though most of us had never rung a bell before. Now, six months after starting out we are prepared to call ourselves a team – albeit a novice one. The tower is affiliated to the Guild and three of us are members.

The Guild have been extremely helpful. Derek Ballard and Brenda Eastell have shown endless patience with training, while Ian Campbell and Ian Smith have inspected the tower and provided much sought after technical knowledge. Help, support, and encouragement from the teams of neighbouring towers has also been greatly appreciated.

The last few months have been busy: We've not only learnt a basic standard of ringing, but have also battled against the inevitable clearing of jackdaw debris, with about five cubic metres being shifted down the seventy steps of the spiral stair well. We've suffered a broken slider due to woodworm damage (causing a few minor rope burns), and a broken clapper on the treble (no injuries, but expensive). All is clean and up and working now, but there are still plenty of nuts to unseize and tighten, ropes to splice, and pulley blocks to free up.


The competition has not been held since Exeter hosted the event in 2019 (due to Covid-19), where we won the competition and became only the seventh different team to win the competition in its 48-year history.

Fundraising at Hatherleigh

Hatherleigh ringers have recently embarked on a major fundraising appeal to restore their eight bells. The architectural features of the church tower and spire (1300s to 1400s) coincide with economic prosperity from wool in the Middle Ages but there is no known written record of actual bells until 1553, when the Inventory, or Survey of Church Goods, lists three. It is possible these were the work of the Exeter Foundry as Exeter bells are still found in neighbouring churches. Little more is known until 1813, when Thomas Bilbie III of Cullompton recast any existing bells to make a ring of six. Two trebles were added by Taylor's of Loughborough in 1883 when a new frame was installed. This was made either by Stokes, or Hooper, of Woodbury. No signature has as yet been found on the frame.

The *Bell News and Ringers Record* published an article on the dedication of bells and the opening peal on 9 October 1883 when a party of Devonshire Guild members assembled to ring. The writer remarks that Bilbie 'seems to have had a mania for turning out maiden peals, utterly regardless of tune. This peal is no exception, for the musicians of the party declared that there was very little difference between the 4th and the 5th, and the same might have been said of the 7th and tenor.'

Unless tone deaf, this sad state of affairs must have been all too obvious to sisters Elizabeth and Heroine Churchward, who lived in a house overlooking the churchyard. In 1929 they funded the recasting of all eight bells, as well as a chiming clock, in memory of their late brother, George Gould Churchward. The eight bells were recast by

Mears and Stainbank of Whitechapel Foundry. The bells are tuned to F major, with a tenor weight of 13cwt 2qr 6lb.

For the last one hundred years ringers and townspeople of Hatherleigh have enjoyed the sound of greatly improved bells, widely-known for good tuning and beautiful tone. However, they have had a reputation for being difficult to ring except, as *The Exeter and Plymouth Gazette* reported at the 1929 rehang, 'to their regular ringers who had become accustomed to their 'go' through habitual usage'. Nowadays their 'go' is a challenge even to regular ringers. The frame was steel-braced in 1929 and was probably already causing problems. Today it flexes, making ringing unpredictable, so bolts must be tightened regularly; ropes are long, and after the addition of the church clock they do not all hang vertically.

Bellhangers were consulted in 2019 and reports concluded that the frame could not be repaired. A new steel one is required, along with general restoration of the bells. The need for this work coincides with the church's separate fundraising campaign for repairs and modernisation. To accommodate some of the church's alterations, the ringing floor will be raised one level, so reducing the length of the ropes.

The project must raise a total of £75,000 and recently secured the cash deposit to book the services of bellhanger Matthew Higby. Bells are likely to come down at the end of 2022, or early 2023.

Teignmouth Peal Board Dedication

6 January 1920 saw the formation of the Mid-Devon Branch and to celebrate our Centenary the branch committee had a series of events planned to run throughout the year. Sadly, due to Covid lockdown restrictions being put in place in March 2020, only the first two of these came to fruition — a celebratory lunch held at The Drum in Cockington, Torquay and a peal rung at St Michael's, Teignmouth. These venues were chosen as Cockington and Teignmouth were both founder member towers.

The 100th anniversary date, 6 January 2020 was therefore set for a peal attempt and Teignmouth tower captain Martin Dodd happily made the bells available. The band was specially chosen to represent several towers within the Branch. A fine peal of 5024 Cambridge Surprise Major was duly rung, conducted by Mike Mears. Then lockdown came. During this period, the Teignmouth ringers decided they would like to have a peal board made to record the event and the idea was welcomed by the Branch. Sadly, Martin Dodd died in April 2021 and so didn't get to see the finished board, but I'm sure he would have been thrilled to see it hung in the ringing room.

Now, after more than two years, the peal board has been manufactured and as part of the branch practice held at St Michael's on 17 May 2022, arrangements were made to hold a short dedication ceremony. Thus, the board was dedicated by the Rector, Revd Carol Green, in front of a 'congregation' of around 25 branch members. She spoke briefly and knowledgably about the effort required to ring a peal and said how thrilled she was that Teignmouth had been chosen to mark this significant milestone in the history of the Branch. Following prayers, she dedicated the board to the Glory of God.

The assembled group then moved up the tower to see where the board would hang and during the remainder of the evening enjoyed ringing a variety of methods, including a well struck half course of Yorkshire S Major and a splendid touch of Stedman Triples.

Many thanks to all those involved, especially Revd Carol Green for the dedication, Mike Mears for calling the peal and tower secretary Julia Brett for making all the arrangements.

So, it was great to finally ring on these bells. What a contrast!! The new bells are an absolute joy to ring and listen to. With a tenor weighing approximately one ton they are quite big but go superbly and sound magnificent – a real credit to the local ringers for raising the money and acting as volunteers and to Taylors' for a superb modern ring. We were a little short on numbers, but we managed to keep the eight ringing to a variety of methods and call changes.

A Quarter Peal for Martin Dodd at last

It seems hard to believe that it is now over one year since we heard the shock news that Martin Dodd had died suddenly on Good Friday. Since then attempts to commemorate his life have been dogged by cancellations, mainly due to Covid. We have previously recorded the memorial day/tower grab in his memory and are now pleased to be able to report that a quarter peal has been rung to commemorate his life

Other News around the County Bells ring again at Huntshaw

A taste of things to come!







Huntshaw church

On Saturday 14 May Ian Campbell gave a brilliant talk on 'bells and the art of ringing' at Huntshaw church in North Devon which was attended by 65 people. Ian explained right from the basics of what a bell is made of, through to the mechanics of how it rings, gave examples on his laptop with loudspeakers of different rings, of changes and peals in towers across Devon – and ended with some lapping on handbells, where volunteers from the audience demonstrated how the end bell (with tinsel tied round it) moved up the line and back down again, to show how changes work.

The weather was kind and people spilled out with their chairs and cream teas onto the grass outside to enjoy the sunshine after the talk whilst Ian showed many who wanted to try the big bell on its stand how to ring it, and to leave it in the 'up' position.

The Bideford Town Crier called us to order at various stages to make it a memorable event and the 600-year-old 'Huntshaw Nail' found aloft in the belfry woodwork went for £50 in the informal auction. Overall £1000 was made on the day, bringing our total raised so far to £22k out of the £30k needed.

The reason for all this of course is that Huntshaw's bells need restoring as they are sinking under their own weight in the medieval oak frame, plus the second bell is cracked. The tower was added to the church in 1439 with three bells and the earliest (tenor) dates from

1505, with the others from 1634 and 1665. All three haven't been rung in 60 years and swing chiming of the treble was stopped about 20 years ago, because it was thought to be unsafe.

As soon as our faculty was granted in January 2021, we started applying for grants, but it wasn't until August 2021 that Covid allowed us to start holding fundraising events such as an open day, then a dowsing workshop and archaeological talks.

One thing we did start in August was a 'Friend of Huntshaw Bells' group, inviting people to be sponsors for £10 (or more!). Lord Clinton

agreed to be our Patron and the plan is to produce a souvenir pamphlet of the bell restoration, with photos of removal, some information and history on them, and of their rehanging. Sponsors are to get a copy, with a list of their names and brief location at the end for those contributing.
