Devon ringers' Carol service 2023 – St Marychurch

This has become established as a major part of the ringing calendar in Devon and a chance for ringers from both traditions to get together to celebrate Christmas. This was the first time that it had been held at St Marychurch and we had a very warm welcome from Preb Nick Debney who led the service. The bells were rung beforehand for an hour, led by Guild Ringing Master David Hird. As usual, Ian Avery had assembled a choir to provide some of the music and to lead the congregation in the carols. We are very grateful that Wyn Turner travelled all the way from Wales to play the organ for us.

Opening with Vivaldi's *Gloria* we soon moved on to 'Once in Royal David's City' to start our carols. St Marychurch handbell ringers played 'Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring' and also joined the choir for 'the Carol of the Bells'. Readings were given by Steven Came, Wendy Gill, Nicola Jones and Don Roberts.

The Exeter ringers rang Kent Treble Bob Major on handbells. Once Fr Debney had read the final lesson we had the ringers' hymn 'Ring out ye Bells Below' and the proceedings came to an end with 'O Come All Ye Faithful'. Wyn made sure no-one was dozing by starting with a fine fanfare on the organ and we ended with a spirited descant 'Sing Choirs of Angels'. Everyone agreed that it was a wonderfully uplifting service. Next year it moves to Crediton parish church.

Guild Committee meeting 20 January 2024

The January Guild committee meeting is attended by Guild officers and representatives from all branches. The main business is to approve the reports from each area of Guild activity which will be printed in the annual report and to make proposals which will be put to the membership at the AGM in June.

- It was agreed to propose the increase of the subscription from £11 to £12 which will produce an estimated surplus of £2,900.
- It is proposed to increase the contribution from peals rung for the Guild to £1 per ringer (from 60p) to cover the costs of updating the Guild's peal records.
- The new membership system is mostly working well, with a few relatively minor matters that need attention.
- It is suggested that quarter peals recorded on BellBoard that are rung by bands comprising over 50% Guild

- members should be entered under the GDR to simplify identification as Guild quarter peals.
- Three new Vice-presidents will be proposed at the AGM.
- Peter Bill is the current master-elect and will become Master at the AGM. A new master-elect will be sought to become Master in 2025.
- The officers are looking for someone to help administer the membership system for 2025 and beyond. Volunteers would be welcomed!
- The Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund has an upcoming Trustee vacancy. The Fund will be looking for someone who has practical experience of bell maintenance and restoration.





Duncan Malloch 1942-2024

10 James Kirkcaldy



Duncan was born in Greater Manchester in 1942, the 2nd of 5 siblings. In the late 1950s, ringing at Ashton under Lyne was at a low ebb. Several youngsters were recruited from the congregation including Duncan and his older brother. They were all taught by Joan Carter, herself not much older than the recruits. They made steady progress such that they formed the basis of a new band ringing regularly for service and practice. Duncan's first peal was in May 1958 with it being a first peal for five of the recent recruits and first as conductor for Joan – a great achievement for the band.

After leaving school, Duncan studied medicine in Edinburgh but did not ring there. He worked as a GP in Exeter and while waiting to collect his son from a bagpipe lesson, he heard bells being rung at a practice. He returned to ringing at Heavitree and Exeter Cathedral. He was diagnosed with cancer in 1988 which then led to his retirement from medicine in 1990. He moved to Scotland and for many years was involved with ringing at the two towers in Dundee including many quarters and one peal – Plain Bob Triples for the SACR 75th anniversary celebrations. He hosted one memorable pizza party and enlisted neighbours' ovens to ensure that all the offerings were ready at the same time!

With the installation of a ring of six at St Andrews in 2011, Duncan became involved in ringing there for service, practice, weddings and graduations. Health issues occurred frequently but each time he was determined to return to ringing – as well as

Training programme for 2024 in East Devon

Last November I sent an email to every branch member via the distribution list in an attempt to find out exactly what ringers needed help with. Not surprisingly, the top choice was for raising and lowering in peal. There were also requests for Plain Hunt and Plain Bob Doubles/Grandsire Doubles training sessions. Furthermore, five tower captains requested help at their own practices to boost the support for their learners. Once the replies were received, Ian Rees, Sue King and I drew up a training programme for the first few months of this year which is already underway:

January – Raising and Lowering in Peal (1) at Kilmington. The middle four bells (2-5) were chosen with a learner ringing 4, expertly led up and down by lan. It was a highly successful training session.

February/March – a Plain Hunt three-week two-hour course at three different towers. The four learners are at different stages of plain hunting but all are making excellent progress and we have a lot of fun!

March – Raising and Lowering in Peal (2) at Kilmington (fully booked).

May – a three-week two-hour course focusing on Plain Bob Doubles and Grandsire Doubles at three different towers (fully booked).

For the five towers whose captains requested in-tower help, three experienced ringers have been along to occasional practices to boost their bands. So far, four such practices have taken place and I'm certain that more will be arranged before long.

I'm delighted that we have two ringers with potential among our helpers who have been ringing for just a couple of years themselves.

All the above workshops/courses are in addition to the regular branch practices and Ian Rees's special monthly practices on eight bells.

It's been a busy and rewarding start to the programme and I think it's going to continue that way!

Combeinteignhead was the first tower of the afternoon as there was a wedding at Stokeinteignhead. Numbers were down a bit, but we managed a variety of ringing on these bells which take a bit of getting used to. We were all impressed by the well decorated ringing room and the array of certificates etc from the local band.

Numbers had increased significantly by the time we all gathered at Stokeinteignhead. Even with more ringers it was not too easy to get a band to ring as we caught up with each other and some warmed up with very welcome cups of tea. It was soon time for the service, and this was very professionally led by Hugh (Mac) of the local band. As usual we proved that ringers can sing well and Mac also gave us a thoughtful address. Thanks also go to Rodney for showing his versatility by playing the organ.

The local band had excelled themselves with the tea and we enjoyed a wonderful spread ably supervised by Sheila and Jenny.

The meeting was dispensed with fairly swiftly. These are not the official minutes so we will just give a flavour of the proceedings. Reports from the officers showed that our membership was reasonably stable and finances were sound. It was decided that in general tower donations will be taken from branch funds which means that this will be a benefit of membership. Non-members will be asked for a contribution – particularly for training events. Outing donations will be reduced for members as well, with these donations being decided depending on the number of towers involved.

The branch events had been fairly well attended and mention was made of good work in training ringers at Babbacombe and in almost all branch towers – an outcome of initiatives such as 'Ring for the King' and the WI days at Buckfast Abbey. Several returning ringers were mentioned as well but still there is evidence that there are more out there if we can find them.

The programme for 2024 was approved and a few changes mentioned. It was announced that we intend holding a 'Meet the Branch Day' in April. This will probably be on the lines of a very successful day held a few years ago.

A guild certificate was presented to Jenny Rose of the local band and it was announced that Berry Pomeroy had been awarded the Edden Clapper trophy for excellent progress in the last 12 months. This included progress in Plain Bob and up to Cambridge Surprise. Thanks to all who had travelled some distance to attend, the prize going to Bob Sanders who told us it was 75 minutes each way - true dedication.

John's association with us goes back many years. His ministry took him all over Devon and he was instrumental in the augmentation to ten at Axminster.

Throughout the 24 hours Sheila and Rodney were supported by several members of the congregation including fellow ringers. Then... they came to support the carol service at St Marychurch – wow! Very well done and we do hope you raised a good sum of money. And then got a well earned rest!

Highweek training Saturdays

Sitting in The Grange listening to Sunday ringing at Buckfast Abbey I remembered that Martin asked me to write a paragraph or two on our recent training mornings at Highweek. January has been a busy month for training which is why the task has slipped my memory: we have now had three Saturday mornings there, extra sessions to the weekly Wednesday practice. These have focussed on the first steps in learning Plain Hunt and we have had just two 'students' per session. One could say this is by invitation only, but if you'd like an invitation please ask because there are more sessions in the pipeline.

If you are a Guild member it's pretty obvious why we are doing this. Method ringers in Devon are scattered and most towers manage only call changes for Sunday service ringing. Whilst this can sound lovely, in my opinion a mix of call changes and method is a more pleasant start to a Sunday morning and makes for a more stimulating practice.

Recruitment under the 'Ring for the King' initiative went well in our part of the Mid Devon region, resulting in a regular practice at Highweek, some brand new ringers at Bovey and Lustleigh and a significant number of lapsed ringers now adding to our numbers. We have now reached the point where most of our new learners are competent at rounds and call changes but have not yet had the chance to try method ringing.

For a while now at Highweek we have tried some kaleidoscope ringing such as making long or short places, dodging and plain hunting on 3 bells. With only Robert and me as method ringers we've made the most of visitors to extend this, so we were excited when Robert Brown (Wobbly Bob) and Mike Wigney suggested Saturday morning training.

Armed with coffee and biscuits, a portable heater and the promise of lunch at The Highweek Village Inn we tackled Plain Hunt on five bells. We actually stretched to Triples on the second week with some additional volunteer ropes.

What have we learned? Well of course the students have made a start on hunting up and down, but we have learned things too. Being 'just a rope' for two hours can be rather boring so it is important to either share the teaching or have something extra for the more experienced ringers: taking turns to stand with a learner, to call a touch, to lead up/down or to be asked to critically watch and comment on a learner as they ring. Two hours seems an optimum duration; using the lighter six is easier on the arms and adding in odd little Doubles methods makes it an interesting challenge for everyone.


January Branch Practice - Denbury



Beyond Call Changes

Acquiring new skills, broadening my circle of friends and visiting interesting new places were among the reasons that I came back to bell ringing after a fifty-year break (I was a novice for a year in my teens). The course that Phil Dunn led during February ticked all these boxes. The three Saturday morning sessions were designed to help novices develop the handling, listening and observational skills that facilitate method ringing.

The first session was at Cornwood church, which I had not visited before. Phil started by getting the novices to ring call changes, paying attention to accurate striking. After a protracted period ringing the same sequence and trying to maintain a good rhythm my brain was almost in neutral. It came as a huge shock when I was suddenly asked, 'which bell is following you?' After a moment of panic I blurted a bell number and was told to think again. It was the start of a steep learning curve as I struggled to develop an awareness of the importance of knowing your place. The next exercise introduced us to changing on both hand and back stroke, not easy after several years of only changing on the hand stroke.

The next week we were at St Andrew, Whitchurch. Phil built on the previous week's exercises by calling the changes by place rather than by bell number — 'third place to fourth place', etc. This reinforced the importance of 'place' and also developed rope sight and listening skills. I found it quite difficult, sometimes needing to stare at sallies bobbing up and down for some time before I worked out who was where!

The final session was at St Mary, Sampford Spiney, a church and an area completely new to me despite its proximity to both home and regularly visited places. As not all the novices had been able to attend all the sessions there was quite a lot of recapitulation and consolidation. The bells were re-hung in 2008 and are a nice peal, but as they are so much lighter than I am used to I did tend to overpull initially.

I would like to thank all those branch members who generously gave up their Saturday mornings to help us. I am particularly grateful to Phil and Alena for their patience and forbearance as I began my journey 'beyond call changes'.

Guild provides labour for work at Colaton Raleigh

Colaton Raleigh Bells back in action

The six bells at Colaton Raleigh are in full swing again - a welcome and inescapable reminder of an active church in the village!

Due to extreme weather in recent years, the oak frame supporting the bells had shrunk, allowing excessive movement when the bells were rung. If allowed to continue, this would have caused serious damage to the bells and potentially to the tower. It had already caused cracking of the headstocks of the tenor and fifth bells, both of which have been ringing since the fifteenth century. The frame has now been firmly stabilised by the addition of wall brackets, and the damaged headstocks have been repaired.

At the same time, the clappers and bearings of all six bells have had their 25 yearly service. This work was carried out by Nicholson Engineering of Bridport with the able-bodied assistance of an enthusiastic team of volunteers organised by Rob Gilding, and Ian Campbell of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers.

This work would not have been possible without generous grants from the Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund, Garfield Weston Foundation, Benefact Trust and Colaton Raleigh Church Preservation Fund for which the PCC is very grateful.

A budding Banksey?

Bell inspection at Venn Ottery



The treble on the left (in the up position) with the second to the right (down).

Note the iron band around the top of the second.

A ringer has recently moved into Venn Ottery and asked if the Guild Bell Advisors could have a look at the bells to see if they could be made ringable. They consist of three bells, tuned approximately chromatically (which sounds a little unusual).

The tenor dates from at least 1553, while the second is comparatively new (Pennington, 1657). The treble is more recent (Mears, 1844). They were rehung in an oak frame by Harry Stokes of Woodbury in 1900. Very little, if anything, has been done to them since then! The treble and tenor are in reasonable condition for their age and can be rung from the ground floor, but only safely if some of the things stored there are removed.

The second is badly cracked across the top of the bell. Some time in the past it has had an iron band put round its shoulder, which will stop it falling into two halves if the crack gets any worse. However it has not been considered safe to ring and the wheel and other fittings have been removed. The advisors did a thorough inspection and presented the church with a printed report which identified a number of ways forward.

The peals have been called by 97 separate conductors; the leaders are Mike Mears:295, John Martin:132, David House:91, myself:77.
