RULES.

* * *

I.—That this Society be called "THE GUILD OF DEVONSHIRE RINGERS," and that it have for its objects the promotion of a reverent feeling among Church Bell-ringers for their sacred office, Belfry Reform, and the cultivation of Change-ringing.

II.—That it shall consist of Honorary and Performing Members and Associates, and that the Bishop of the Diocese, being a Member, shall always be Patron.

III.—That Members duly qualified shall be admitted at any meeting of the Guild, if proposed by a Member and approved by the Committee. That the Committee have also power to elect Members at any Committee meeting. That no election be complete until the first Subscription be paid.

IV.—That any person subscribing not less than 5s. annually shall be an Honorary Member. Each Performing Member who is attached to a band in Union shall contribute annually the sum of 1s., and each unattached Performing Member shall contribute annually the sum of 2s. to the funds of the Guild. But no one shall receive the Certificate of the Guild as a Performing Member until the Committee are satisfied that he has rung a changing tower bell in a touch of 120 changes. Lady Associates shall become entitled to the certificate when they can ring 120 changes on an inside bell with hand-bells. Associates in connexion with any belfry paying 5s. subscription annually shall have the privilege of being taught Change-ringing by competent Instructors appointed by the Guild, but shall not have the power of voting until they become Members. Such Instructors' expenses to be paid by the Associates or a proportion thereof as determined by the Secretary.

V.—That Honorary Members may become Life Members on payment of £5, and Performing Members who do not reside in the County of Devon may become Life Members on payment of 5s. No Life Member will receive any pecuniary assistance or notices from the Guild unless he is specially employed.

VI.—That at the Annual Meeting in each year the Members present shall elect from either the Honorary Members or Performing Members a President, not less than four Vice-Presidents (besides the Archdeacons, who, being Members, shall be ex-officio Vice-Presidents), Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, and Assistant Hon. Secretary for each Archdeaconry, who, with five persons elected from the Honorary Members, together with

one representative from each band in Union, and the Instructors, shall form the General Committee of Management, of whom three shall form a quorum, the Committee having power to add to their number from time to time. If a representative Member of the Committee finds himself unable to attend a Committee Meeting, he may select a deputy (who must belong to his own band and be a Member).

VII.—That the Committee shall fix the time and place of the Annual Meetings, which shall always be held between Easter Day and the 1st of June in each year; and shall also arrange from time to time for united practices of the Guild.

VIII.—That all Subscriptions shall become due on January 1st. No member whose Subscription is three months in arrear shall be entitled to any privileges of membership until the arrears be paid.

IX.—That the expense incurred by Members (not being Life Performing Members) in attending Ringing Meetings arranged by the Committee may, when the funds in the hands of the Committee admit, be paid by the Guild, and that no Member shall draw from the Guild any amount towards expenses unless he can ring a changing tower bell in a touch of 120 changes, the foreman or representative of each band to certify the same; but on such an occasion each band shall be allowed to claim the expenses of one tenor man even though he may not be able to ring a changing bell.

X.—That the ordinary times of practice of each Band in Union be stated in the Annual Report.

XI.—That Bands in Union with the Guild undertake to ring on the great Church Festivals if required to do so by the Incumbent of the Parish.

XII.—That no Member shall take part in any ringing match for a prize; should he do so, he will be liable to immediate expulsion from the Guild.

XIII.—That no Member shall forward any communication to the Public Press reflecting upon any Band in Union with the Guild or upon any Member thereof, without first obtaining permission of the Secretary, who shall, as early as possible, bring the matter before the Committee, either at an ordinary or special meeting.

XIV.—That any alteration in or addition to the above Rules shall only be made at an annual or special meeting convened for the purpose.

Report of the Committee.

Since the publication of the last Report the Roll of Honour of the Guild has grown considerably, among the fallen being J. A. Snow, of Withycombe; W. Williams, Holbetoa; G. F. Hitt, Clyst Hydon; A. W. Cearley, Musbury; and W. J. Blight, Cockington. With the advent of the Armistice and the probable imminence of the much-desired preliminary Peace, it may be hoped that this list is now complete. At the great Commemoration Service at St. Clement Danes your Guild was represented by Mr. W. Shepherd, of Mersham. It may be noted that among the names of London ringers specially remembered at that Service occurs that of one who learnt his ringing in the Devon Guild, namely, W. D. James, of Charles, Plymouth.

In accordance with the wishes expressed at the last Annual Meeting, your Committee has been considering the best means for spreading the knowledge of and desire for Change Ringing throughout the Diocese. They consider that this is most likely to be effected by stimulating the enthusiasm and healthy emulation of various parts of the County by the formation of District Associations or Local Branches, each with its own officers and with power to employ a proportion of the funds provided by the subscriptions of the Members in the Branch. Your Committee beg to submit a draft of proposed Rules for these Local Branches (District Associations) for the consideration of the Annual Meeting.

From the Reports received from Parochial Bands it is evident that the beneficial effect of demobilisation is beginning to be felt. No doubt patience will be needed in this as in other matters before ringing will be resumed with full enthusiasm. There are, however, hopeful signs of the expansion of Method Ringing in several directions. At present there are 34 Bands affiliated to the Guild.

One Minor Peal on handbells was rung in 1918.

Reports from Bands in Union.

THE CATHEDRAL.—Our Band has not been able to do much during the past year, as several of our members have been away on National Service, but, with most of them returned, we hope to make some progress in new methods. We greatly regret the loss to the Band of Mr. John Ferris, who has left Devon for Hertfordshire. He was a good ringer, and will be much missed. He carries with him the best wishes of all the Band to his new home.

CALVERLEIGH.—No ringing throughout the year on account of members being at the Front. They are arriving home again now, and we hope to report progress next year.

CLYST HYDON.—Nothing to report this year, but hope to have better news next year.

CHARLES.—Nearly all the boys are in the Army. When some of them have been home on leave, we have invariably endeavoured to make up quarter peal for them, some of which have been successful, with the kind help of Mr. Malins, of Rugby and others who have been training in the Garrison. The Sunday ringing has been kept going by several choir boys whom our leader has taught to handle the front six, which they do nicely. It is our leader's aim and wish that these lads should fill the places of those who from any cause may be giving up ringing. We were sorry to lose a most promising member at a few days' notice—Mr. Price (Metropolitan Police) who was moved to Chelsea. We are anxiously looking forward to our boys' return.

CLYST ST. GEORGE.—We have only rung once during the year, namely, at Christmas, when some of our soldier-members were home on leave. They are now being demobilised, and we hope soon to start again.

COCKINGTON.—We deeply regret that since our last report we have lost one member, Pte W. J. Blight, of the 2nd Devons, who died in a London Hospital, and was buried in Torquay Cemetery on April 27th, 1918. We rang a knell for him. The Sunday ringing has been well maintained, and good progress has been made with young beginners.

EXETER, ST. SIDWELL'S.—The members have regularly rung for Service on Sundays during the past year; rung on Armistice Day, and are looking forward to ringing for Peace. We have not rung any peals, and no towers have been visited during the year. We still have three members with the Forces, but hope they will soon return in safety. We will give them a hearty welcome.

EXETER, ST. DAVID'S.—The last year of the war tried us sorely by taking away male members, but, fortunately, the help of lady members kept us going. Sunday ringing has been maintained. Two 500's and a Quarter Peal of Grandsire have been rung. Miss Ida Hocking rang her first quarter in the latter. She and the other ladies who are taking a keen interest in the science are to be congratulated on their progress. The Armistice having been signed, we are hoping for more freedom in ringing.

ST. THOMAS, EXETER.—Many members of the Band have been away, so that the bells have not been rung for some months. But we are happy to say that all the ringers who have been on service have had their lives spared, and hope shortly to resume the old ringing meetings.

HEAVITREE.—Owing to so many of our Band being absent during 1918, our work has been restricted to ringing for Service on the first Sunday in the month and on special occasions—such as the Bishop's visit, the Great Festivals, and Armistice Day. When Peace is proclaimed we hope to make a fresh start and bring on a few recruits.

HOLBETON.—We are sorry to report the death of Corporal W. Williams, who was killed in France. He was very keen on change ringing. On April 6th, for Corporal C. C. Vanstone, we rang a knell with the help of Gunner J. Reely (home on leave from Salonica) and Cadet M. T. Washbrook (the latter since killed in action). On July 1st a peal of Bob Minor was rung on handbells at the Vicarage.

HOLCOMBE ROGUS.—Having been dependent on call-change ringers, very little half-pull has been done. On Armistice Day we had a fairly good time. With the assistance of the village blacksmith (who has not rung for 20 years), the bells were set going at 1 o'clock, and rung at intervals during the afternoon and evening. We hope soon to have some members demobilised and to bring on learners, and re-establish our practice night.

KELLY.—We have not been able to have any practices during the year, but the Sunday ringing has been well attended to, and progress has been made in striking the bells. The Band can now,

without the assistance of the President, strike a six-score of Grandsire Doubles accurately. It is hoped in the ensuing winter that some progress will be made in Bob Minor.

MUSBURY.—This Band has been able to do little ringing, as so many of the members have been serving with the Colours. But we managed to ring a few times when some of the soldier-members were on leave, and helped from the Colyton Band. We are sorry to report the death of Sergeant A. W. Cearley, Dorset Regiment, who on May 23 was wounded during an air raid while in hospital. We are also sorry to report that Pte J. Hoare cannot ring any more owing to the effects of wounds received in France. We hope to pick up again, and give a better report next year.

SOWTON.—There was very little change ringing during the last year owing to most of our members being in H.M. Forces. We have kept practice night going, and generally rung once on Sundays with the help of our juniors. We are teaching some lady ringers, who seem to take a great interest in the art of ringing. We hope during the autumn and winter to teach them and the juniors change ringing, and so get them elected to the Guild.

TEIGNMOUTH.—Nothing to report, the bells having been idle since 1915. Practice has now re-commenced.

THORVERTON.—Nothing done during 1918. Regular practice has again started.

TOPSHAM.—We have rung regularly with the help of visitors and our lady members, who have got on extremely well with the handling of bells, and are now getting on with the science of change ringing.

TORRINGTON.—Not much to report for 1918. All our serving members are alive as yet—J. Holwill in India, and R. Davey in Bath Hospital for rheumatism. C. Heywood has returned to us, young, strong, and hearty, having recovered from his early wounds.

WASHFIELD.—We are pleased to report that the four members of our Band serving with His Majesty's Forces have come through safely. The ringing for Services has been regular. Our lady members are taking a good hand at change ringing, and we are looking forward to soon having a strong Band.

WITHYCOMBE RALEIGH.—Nearly all the members of the Band were called up during the war, only three remaining, so there was no ringing. Mr. G. Rendell has returned from active service, and, with the help of Messrs. E. G. Stocker and R. C. Manley, we are able to ring six bells for Service and continue the practices. We can ring Grandsire Doubles. Messrs. J. Hayman, W. Hayman, and R. Snow were home on leave during the Christmas, and greatly helped the ringing. We hope soon to be able to make progress. We much regret the loss of Mr. J. A. Snow, who was killed during the war.
