Sanctioned by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

It is hoped that the Clergy will encourage the use of these Prayers and by this means strengthen the connection of Ringers with the Church :—

O ALMIGHTY GOD, Who of old didst ordain the sound of the golden bells on the robe of the high priest to be a figure of the Voice of Thy SON, the great High Priest: Grant that the sound of these our bells may be as a message from Him to the people, bidding them to come and adore devoutly in Thy Sanctuary; through the same JESUS CHRIST our Lord. *Amen.*

O LORD, we beseech Thee mercifully to bless us who are appointed to the ministry of calling Thy people to worship in Thy House; preserve us from evil, accident, and misfortune; give us the grace of reverence, and a sober mind; and bring us all hereafter to take part in the worship that the holy Angels offer Thee in heaven; through JESUS CHRIST our Lord. *Amen.*

Office before Ringing a Peal.

IN the Name of the FATHER and of the SON and of the HOLY GHOST. *Amen.*

Praise Him upon the well-tuned cymbals: praise Him upon the loud cymbals.

PREVENT us, O LORD, in all our doings with Thy most gracious favour, and further us with Thy continual help, that in all our works begun, continued, and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy Holy Name, and finally, by Thy mercy, attain unto everlasting life; through JESUS CHRIST our Lord. *Amen.*

After the Peal.

THE grace of our Lord JESUS CHRIST, and the love of GOD, and the fellowship of the HOLY GHOST, be with us all for evermore. *Amen.*

GUILD RULES.

I. That this Society be called THE GUILD OF DEVONSHIRE RINGERS, and that it have for its objects the promotion of a reverent feeling among Church Bell-ringers for their sacred office, Belfry reform, and the cultivation of Change-Ringing.

II. That it shall consist of Honorary Members, Performing Members, and Associates; and that the Bishop of the Diocese, being a Member, shall always be Patron.

III. That Members duly qualified shall be admitted at any meeting of the Guild, if proposed by a Member, and approved by the Committee (hereafter called the General Committee). That the General Committee and Branch Committees have also power to elect Members at any Committee meetings. That no election be complete until the first Subscription be paid.

IV. That any person subscribing not less than 5s. annually shall be an Honorary Member. Each Performing Member and Associate who is attached to a Band in union, and each unattached Performing Member, shall contribute annually the sum of 2s. to the funds of the Guild. But no one shall receive the Certificate of the Guild as a Performing Member until the Committee are satisfied that he has rung a changing tower-bell in a touch of 120 changes. Lady Associates shall become entitled to the Certificate when they can ring 120 changes on an inside bell with hand-bells. Associates shall have the privilege of being taught change-ringing by competent Instructors appointed by the Guild, but shall not have the power of voting until they become Members; such Instructors' expenses to be paid by the Associates, or a proportion thereof, as determined by the General Secretary.

V. That Honorary Members may become Life Members on payment of £5; and Performing Members who do not reside in the county of Devon may become Life Members on the payment of 5s. No Life Member will receive any pecuniary assistance or notices from the Guild unless he is specially employed.

VI. That at the Annual General Meeting in each year the Members present shall elect from either the Honorary Members or the Performing Members a President, not less than four Vice-Presidents (besides the Archdeacons who, being members, shall be ex-officio Vice-Presidents), Hon. Secretary (hereafter known as the General Secretary), and Treasurer (hereafter known as the General Treasurer), who, with five persons elected from the Honorary Members, together with one Representative of each Band in union and the Chairmen and Secretaries of the Local Branches, shall form the General Committee of Management, of whom three shall form a quorum; the Committee having power to add to their number from time to time. If a Local

Secretary finds himself unable to attend a General Committee Meeting he may select a deputy (who must belong to his own Branch and be a Member). If a Representative Member of the General Committee finds himself unable to attend a Committee meeting, he may select a deputy (who must belong to his own Band and be a Member).

VII. That the General Committee shall fix the time and place of the Annual Meetings, which shall always be held between Easter Day and the 1st June in each year; and shall also arrange from time to time for United Practices of the Guild.

VIII. That all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st. No Member whose subscription is three months in arrear shall be entitled to any privileges of membership until the arrears be paid.

IX. That the expense incurred by Members (not being Life Performing Members) in attending Ringing Meetings arranged by the General Committee may, when the funds in the hands of the Committee admit, be paid by the Guild.

X. That the ordinary times of practice of each Band in union be stated in the Annual Report.

XI. That Bands in union with the Guild undertake to ring on the great Church Festivals if required to do so by the Incumbent of the Parish.

XII. That no Member shall take part in any Ringing Match for a Prize; should he do so, he will be liable to immediate expulsion from the Guild.

XIII. That no member shall forward any communication to the public Press reflecting upon any Band in union with the Guild or upon any Member thereof, without first obtaining permission of the General Secretary, who shall as early as possible bring the matter before the Committee either at an ordinary or special meeting.

XIV. That any alteration in or addition to the above Rules, or to the Rules of Local Branches, shall only be made at an Annual or Special General Meeting convened for the purpose.



RULES for LOCAL BRANCHES.

1. Every Branch shall be governed by a Committee consisting of a Chairman, a Secretary (who shall also act as Treasurer) and one Member from each Belfry in the Branch. The Incumbents of the Parishes forming the Branch (if Members of the Guild) shall be ex-officio members of the Branch Committee.

2. The Secretary of the Branch shall collect, and forward to the General Secretary not later than January 31st in each year, a correct list of Members, and Reports of the work of the Branch and of its individual Bands for the past year. He shall also send to the General Treasurer by the same date the subscriptions of the members for the current year (including those of Honorary Members collected by him), retaining not more than one-half for local needs, and the Branch Accounts for the past year. The subscriptions of Members elected subsequently shall be sent to the General Secretary not later than December 31st.

3. The election of Branch Officers shall be made at the Annual Meeting of the Branch.

4. The Committee of the Branch shall have the same power as the General Committee to elect Members of the Guild and to award Certificates, which will be issued by the General Secretary on application from the Branch Secretary.

5. Each Branch shall be represented on the General Committee by the Local Chairman and Local Secretary, whose travelling expenses may be paid by the Branch.

6. The Branch Committee shall have the same right to make grants to its Members attending Branch Meetings as is given the General Committee in Guild Rule IX., and shall have the same authority over its Members as is conferred by Guild Rule XII.

REPORT of the GENERAL COMMITTEE.

DURING the past year there has not been any such considerable increase of Affiliated Bands as was recorded in the 1922 Report. This was indeed hardly to be expected, nor was it perhaps even desirable. A certain breathing space was needed to consolidate the ground won. It must never be forgotten that one of the primary objects of the Guild is the advance of Change Ringing. If this purpose be allowed to drop into the background its character will be completely changed, so that mere numerical increase might easily prove disastrous. On this account your Committee have the greatest pleasure in recording a steady, and indeed considerable, issue of change-ringing certificates throughout the year. In the case of more than one Band labelled 'Associate' twelve months ago all the members are now qualified change-ringers. This is matter for real congratulation and rejoicing.

The Cathedral Cinques practice has passed through somewhat difficult times owing to repeated alterations of the day and times, for which the Ringers themselves had no responsibility. Now that the Dean and Chapter have kindly assigned the 2nd Saturday evening in the month for the practice, these meetings have taken, it is hoped, a new lease of life. An innovation which has been made at the Cathedral consists in a monthly invitation to the members of one or other of the City eight-bell Towers to ring there on Sunday morning, the Cathedral Ringers assisting to complete the Band when needed. This privilege has been highly appreciated by those willing to take part.

The Jubilee Festival of the Guild will take place on Whit Monday in Exeter. By the kind invitation of the Dean and Chapter, Service will be held in the Cathedral at 12.15, and the dinner and meeting will be held subsequently at Deller's Restaurant. Your Committee hope that, in addition to a record attendance of present members, as many of the early surviving members as possible will renew old memories by joining in the celebration.

During the year there were rung 9 peals of Grandsire, 2 Caters, 6 Triples, and 1 Doubles.

During the past year the expenditure of the Guild exceeded the receipts by £11 18s. 2d., and moreover the difficulties of the Treasurer in meeting current expenditure is seriously increased by the failure of local Branches to forward their affiliation fees during the first month of the year. In some instances these returns are a full year late. Your Committee hopes that this hint will bring about real improvement in this respect.

REPORTS of LOCAL BRANCHES.

EXETER BRANCH.

THE fourth year's Report of the Exeter and District Area again shows great advancement. The number of Honorary Members is now 49, an increase of 12 since last year, and the total number of Performing Members, &c., is 182. Two Bands have ceased to be associated with the Guild, chiefly on account of their being in places which are difficult to get at by train or bus. One new Band has been added.

The financial position is good, and a further increased subscription over last year has been forwarded to the General Fund. There is still a balance in hand for extension work.

Quarterly meetings have been held at St Thomas, Exeter (100 present) and at Littleham (87 present), as a welcome to the Rev. E. V. Cox who has recently been appointed Vicar of that Parish. At the Annual Meeting at St Sidwell's, Exeter (120 ringers present), a hearty welcome was extended to the Rev Maitland Kelly (President) and several other Clergy.

In regard to peal ringing at the Cathedral Tower, the first peal on the 'Thomas Eight' has been scored by their own Band; also two peals of Grandsire Caters at St Sidwell's. There were two good attempts of Stedman Caters, rung for nearly two hours.

The Chairman (Mr E. Shepherd) visited most of the Towers in this district, and reports progress in Stedman at Withycombe, Littleham, and Topsham, and is pleased to note the enthusiasm as well as good attendance amongst the younger ringers.

One of the old veterans, John Richards, passed away during the year, and a knell was rung on the Cathedral Bells (minor eight).

Through the generosity of E. S. Plummer, Esq. (one of our honorary Members) a new peal of eight was installed at St Thomas last Whitsuntide, and brought together a great gathering of ringers.

EAST DEVON BRANCH.

WE hope that progress is being made in regard to Change Ringing in the district. Sidmouth Band are doing well: they ring Grandsire Doubles, and in the near future will be ringing Triples. Mr G. Betts has rendered this Band good service as instructor. In Honiton we have a most energetic Band; they ring Grandsire Doubles perfectly, and hope soon to master the Stedman method. They do their best to interest neighbouring Bands in change ringing by visiting other Towers. The Buckerell Band are still doing well; and would like to report that they are having another bell to make a ring of six. Payhembury has now a nice ring of six, lately rehung by Gillet and Johnston, in an

iron cage, and the bells go well. The Band has recently joined the Guild.

A band of Lady Ringers has been formed under the tuition of Mr Southwood, of Exeter, and will no doubt soon be members of the Guild. The Talaton Band have regular practices, and are keen to ring Doubles, under the direction of Mr G. C. Woodley, who takes an active interest in change ringing. Ottery St Mary have not accomplished their $\frac{1}{4}$ -peal of Stedman; still, they persevere, and hope to meet with success.

We have had two District Meetings this past year, at Sidmouth and Honiton.

NORTH-EAST DEVON BRANCH.

THE Branch has suffered two severe losses in the past year; first, by the death of the Rev W. G. Carew, Rector of Bickleigh, and secondly, by the removal of our Hon. Sec., the Rev E. V. Cox, from Bampton to Exmouth. As there is no one in the Branch who combines Mr Cox's enthusiasm and knowledge of the art of Ringing, it is inevitable that the work for some months past has been rather to make perfect that which we already have learned than to strike out after new methods.

We have given special attention to the bringing on of young Ringers, and members, especially of St Peter's, Tiverton, and Calverleigh, have done much useful work in this way. The effect will, we anticipate, be to enable some of the weaker Bands to remain in the Guild and, we hope, further strengthen our Branch in the near future by the addition of two new Towers.

The first peal to the credit of our Branch was rung at All Saints', Huntsham, on August 9th, 1923: a peal of Grandsire Triples, 5,040 changes, Parker's six part., in 3 hrs. 3 min.

The bells of S. Peter's, Tiverton, are being re cast, and so have not been available for many months past. We hear that they will be ready for re-hanging early in the year, and when the work is completed we look forward to having a much improved ring of eight in our Branch once more. In the meantime the Ringers have been keeping themselves in training with hand-bells and by helping neighbouring Bands.

NORTH DEVON BRANCH.

HEADWAY continues to be made at Combe Martin. Young men, however, rather fight shy of learning half-pull, but no doubt, as the present band progresses, it will lead others to start. A peal of Doubles has been scored, with 4-6-8 covering the first peal by all except the conductor. Progress has been made in Triples, 336 having been rung

repeatedly for Sunday service. In Grandsire Minor a 360 has been rung.

At Ilfracombe, several 504's of Grandsire Triples have been rung during the year, and 3 quarter-peals. New members are being brought on and are making good progress.

MID-DEVON BRANCH.

SINCE the last Annual Meeting, held at St Mary Church, two very successful meetings have been held, at Kingskerswell and Morton-hampstead respectively.

One peal of Grandsire Triples has been rung at Mortonhampstead, the first on the bells, and the first consisting wholly of members of the Branch.

During the year there have been eight Honorary Members elected, and 17 performing members; and two Towers affiliated, namely, Collaton St Mary and Littlehempstone. At Collaton, good progress has been made, considering they are entirely a young band, none of them taking part in ringing before; they are being carefully tutored by Mr C. F. Austin.

Good practices have been held at St Mary Church, organised by Mr Gover, assisted by members of Paignton Band. Some good useful combined practices have been held at Upton, organised by Mr Bowers; and the Cockington Band has made good progress with Triples.

The Paignton Band has been handicapped considerably, owing to two of the Band, namely, Mrs Gover and Mr Reynolds, being indisposed for months; also, in the loss of Mr Norrish, a very consistent member, who has left the county. Good work has, however, been done in training young members, who are making good progress with Grandsire Triples.

The members of the Branch are very grateful to the Incumbents of St Mary Church and Upton for the unlimited use of their bells for practice.

SOUTH-WEST BRANCH.

EXCELLENT progress has been made by this Branch during the past year, and we can safely say that it has been the most successful since its formation, inasmuch as the number of recruits to each Band in union is greater than in any previous year. Many new members have qualified for certificates, and others have scored either first peals or first quarters.

It is interesting to note that we start the new year with the representative Clergyman from each Band in union with the Guild as a member of the Branch. We heartily welcome this, and appreciate the

many visits paid to the belfry by the Clergy during the ringing meetings. The success of a band of ringers is assured when the Clergy take an interest in their organisation.

One meeting of the Branch was held at Buckland, in May.

The Branch was exceedingly well represented at the Annual Meeting at Cullompton, which afforded them an opportunity of meeting old friends from other Branches.

Splendid progress is reported from all Bands. The St Andrew's Band ring for all Festivals of the Church, and rang one quarter-peal of Caters. The younger members are progressing and four have qualified for certificates during the year. Persistent bad fortune has been experienced by the Charles Band, as the bells have been silenced for months, either through illness near the Church, or for structural repairs. The Band continues to make good progress in higher methods and are to be congratulated on their efforts to introduce change ringing into the Plympton district. They have succeeded in teaching Mr W. Wonnacott who scored his first peal on Dec. 15th, and we sincerely hope this effort will be reflected in the Plympton district during the coming year. The advent of the new Vicar at Emmanuel has been marked by an exceptional number of recruits, and we sincerely hope that members of other bands will render assistance to Mr Woodley, and enable him to bring along what promises to be a very strong Band in the future. The new Vicar is desirous of learning to ring, and we hope to elect him a member at our Annual Meeting. The Kelly Band are still strong in numbers, and in addition to their splendid striking of Grandsire Doubles are making progress with Bob Minor; they have scored one 360, with the help of the General Secretary, the Rev E. S. Powell. The Holbeton Band continue to ring Grandsire and Bob Minor, and one member scored his first peal on eight bells.

It is with deep regret that we have to record the death of Mr J. Y. Woolcombe, an Honorary Member of the Guild. The Woolcombe Family have been associated with the Guild almost from its inception.

The next year being the Jubilee Year of the Guild will, we hope, be marked by continued progress, and celebrated in a manner worthy of such an occasion. Several members have already attended the practice in Cinques at the Cathedral with a view to ringing the first peal in this method in the County to celebrate the occasion.

In conclusion, we appeal to all members to advance the cause of the Guild by their individual efforts, and to the Clergy for their continued support. We shall then confidently look forward to our Jubilee Report from the Parent Society as one worthy of Church-workers throughout the county.
