GUILD RULES

- I. That this Society shall be called "THE GUILD OF DEVONSHIRE RINGERS"; that its objects shall be:
 To recognise the true position of Ringers as Church Workers;
 To encourage ringing for Divine Service;
 To promote order and good feeling among Ringers;
 To cultivate the art of scientific Change Ringing, especially by giving instruction where it is desired; and that it shall be affiliated to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers and loyally abide by the rules and decisions thereof.
- II. That it shall consist of Honorary Members, Honorary Life Members, Performing Members, and Associates, and that the Bishop of Exeter, being a Member, shall always be Patron, and the Suffragan Bishops and Archdeacons, being members, shall be Vice-Presidents.
- III. That duly qualified members and associates shall be admitted at any meeting of the Guild, on being proposed and seconded, and approved by a majority of those voting; that the General Committee and the Branch Committee shall also have power to elect members at any Committee Meeting; and that no election shall be complete until the first subscription has been paid.
 That members incapacitated from further ringing may be nominated Honorary Life Members on being proposed and seconded as such at any Branch or Branch Committee meeting and approved by a majority of those voting, such nominations to be forwarded to the General Secretary for confirmation by the General Committee.
- IV. That an Honorary Member shall subscribe not less than 5/- annually, or by a donation of not less than two guineas become a Life Member; and that each Performing Member and Associate attached to a band in union, and each unattached Performing Member resident in the County of Devon shall contribute annually the sum of 3/- to the funds of the Guild, except that Performing Members and Associates aged 16 and under shall contribute annually 1/6 to the funds of the Guild. That any Member or Associate elected after September 30th in any year shall pay half the subscription for that year which shall be applied to the general fund of the Guild.
- IVa. That no one shall receive the certificate of the Guild as a Performing Member until the Committee are satisfied that he has rung a changing tower bell through a touch of 120 scientific changes.
 That Associates shall have the privilege of being taught by competent Instructors appointed by the Guild, the expenses of such Instructors to be paid by the Associates and the Guild or a Branch of the Guild, in such proportion as may be determined by the General or Branch Committee as the case may be.
- V. That persons resident outside the County of Devon may be elected Non-Resident Members on payment of 5/- terminable on residence in the County. When a Performing Member, who has paid not less than five annual subscriptions, leaves the County, he may apply to be placed on the Non-Resident Members' list without further payment. Non-Resident Members will not be entitled to any pecuniary grant or notices from the Guild unless they are specially employed.
- VI. That at the Annual General Meeting in each year the members present shall elect from either the Honorary Members or the Performing Members—
 A President. At least four Vice-Presidents (in addition to the Suffragan Bishop and Archdeacons), a General Secretary, a General Treasurer, an Auditor, and five representatives from the Honorary Members, to sit on the General Committee. That the General Committee of Management shall consist of the foregoing together with the representatives on the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers, elected triennially at the Annual General Meeting one year previous to each Central Council session, the Chairman and Secretaries of the local Branches and three representatives elected by each Branch, of whom five shall form a quorum. In the event of a casual vacancy among the Officers the General Committee shall have power to elect a successor to act until the next Annual General Meeting, and shall moreover have general powers of management subject to Guild or Branch rules. Nominations for any Guild Office, except those made by the General Committee, must be sent to the General Secretary fourteen days before the Annual General Meeting.
 In the event of a Branch Officer or representative of a Branch being unable to attend a General Committee Meeting, he may appoint a deputy (who must be a member belonging to his own Branch).
- VII. That the General Committee shall fix the time and place of the Annual General Meeting, which shall always be held between Easter Day and the end of June in each year, and shall also arrange from time to time united Practice Meetings of the Guild.
- VIII. That all subscriptions shall become due on January 1st and no member, whose subscription is three months in arrears, shall be entitled to any privileges of membership until arrears be paid.
 That no peal shall be recorded in the Guild Peal Book or Annual Report unless all members taking part have paid their subscriptions.
- X. That the expenses incurred by resident members in attending ringing meetings, arranged by the General Committee, may be paid by the Guild when the funds in the hands of the General Treasurer suffice.

- X. That the ordinary times of practice of each band in union be stated in the Annual Report.
- XI. That bands in union with the Guild shall undertake to ring on the great Festivals of the Church, if required to do so by the Incumbent of the Parish.
- XII. That no member shall forward any communication to the public Press reflecting adversely on any band in union with the Guild, or upon any member thereof, without first obtaining permission from the General Secretary, who shall take the earliest opportunity of bringing the matter before the General Committee.
- XIII. That any alteration or addition to these Rules, or to the Rules of local Branches shall be made only at an Annual or Special General Meeting, after due notice given of the proposed amendment.

RULES FOR LOCAL BRANCHES

1. That every Branch shall be governed by a Committee consisting of a Chairman, a Secretary (who shall also act as Treasurer), and one member from each belfry in the Branch. Incumbents of parishes forming the Branch (if members of the Guild) shall be *ex-officio* members of the Branch Committee.
2. That the Secretary of each Branch shall collect, and forward to the General Secretary not later than January 31st in each year, a correct list of members and reports of the work of the Branch and of its individual bands during the past year.
 He shall also send to the General Treasurer by the same date the subscriptions of the members for the current year (including those of honorary members collected by him), retaining not more than one-half for local needs, and the Branch accounts for the past year. The subscriptions of members elected subsequently shall be sent to the General Secretary not later than December 31st.
3. That the election of Branch Officers and representatives on the General Committee shall be made at the Annual Meeting of the Branch.
4. That the Committee of the Branch shall have the same power as the General Committee to elect members of the Guild, and to award Certificates, which will be issued by the General Secretary on written application from the Branch Secretary on the printed form provided for the purpose.
5. That each Branch shall be represented on the General Committee by the local Chairman and local Secretary, together with three representatives elected annually, whose travelling expenses may be paid by the Branch.
6. That a Branch Committee shall have the same right to make grants to its members attending Branch meetings as is given the General Committee by Guild Rule IX.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE

We are pleased to report that the year under review has been one of steady progress and solid achievement. There have inevitably been some setbacks, but there is no doubt that on balance the gains have more than made up for the losses, and the Guild is better fitted than it was a year ago to carry out the objects for which it was founded.

During 1954 eighty-five new Performing Members have been elected, and three bands have joined us. These are Brixham, Kentisbeare and Uffculme, and we extend to them a most hearty welcome. We much regret to record the loss of Feniton but hope that their lapse of membership will not prove to be permanent. The net result is that our total numbers, excluding non-resident members, have only risen from 525 to 544, which, having regard to the large number of new members is rather disappointing. We should like to take this opportunity of emphasising the need for each Branch to give some form of direct encouragement to every affiliated tower. Much greater use could be made than is the case at present of Branch Instruction Funds, and wise expenditure in this direction would prove not only to be a prudent investment, but would help to give the more lukewarm members an assurance that the Guild is taking a real interest in their progress.

We much regret to record the death of one of our Vice-Presidents, the Rev. Fitzwilliam Carter, who for many years was Chairman of the North-East Branch and who took an active interest in the affairs of the Guild until the very end of his life.

An occasion for National rejoicing was the return of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh from their Empire Tour, when, at the express wish of the Prime Minister, bells everywhere were rung as a "Welcome Home." In this our towers fully played their part.

The Annual Festival was held at Plymouth on Whit Monday and was a fitting celebration of the 80th Anniversary of the Guild's first Annual Meeting there in 1874. Those who were privileged to be present will long remember the welcome given by the officers and members of the South-West Branch, to whose efforts the success of the day was so largely due.

Thirty-three peals have been rung during the year, an increase of seven over last year. Only one of these, the first peal of Major on the back eight, at the Cathedral, was rung by a wholly non-resident band, and the variety of methods rung is greater than for many years. Twenty-five members have scored their first peal, no fewer than 67 "firsts in the method" have been recorded, and two new conductors, Mr. John Quick and Mr. William Webb, have made their appearance.

We should particularly like to congratulate Mr. Sidney Skinner, who has conducted peals in 4, 11, 14 and 21 Doubles Methods, the Combe Martin band who with some outside help have achieved four peals during the year, and the enterprising Minor band who rang three peals on Boxing Day. Other noteworthy peals were those rung in honour of the weddings of our President and the Rev. J. G. M. Scott, and the 80th birthdays of Mr. C. G. Glass and Mr. E. J. Ryall.

Our financial position is satisfactory, the balance in hand, together with the badges in hand at cost, being £81 15s. 1d. as against £68 8s. 7d. last year, an increase of £13 6s. 6d. The Bells Restoration Fund has increased by £13 17s. 0d. and now stands at £186 6s. 9d.

That this report can be regarded with some satisfaction is entirely due to the time and effort put in by all who have in any capacity so willingly given their services. As always the main burden has fallen on the shoulders of Branch Secretaries. To them, and to all Guild and Branch Officers we offer our sincere thanks.

BRANCH REPORTS

AYLESBEARE DEANERY.—Three meetings have been held by the Branch during the year at Sowton, Lymptone and Woodbury with good attendances. The number of members is now 109, fourteen being under the age of sixteen. Twenty-three members were elected during the year. It is with deep regret that we record the death of Mr. H. Hilman. He was for fifty years a regular ringer at Littleham where he will be greatly missed.

Mr. Brian Pidgeon, who has been Hon. Sec. and an active member of the Branch for the last twelve years has had to give up his post as he is now living out of the district. We all hope that he will come and visited us when he can. Mr. Robert Perry was elected Hon. Sec. at the last Annual Meeting to take Mr. Pidgeon's place.

Several peals have been rung by members of the Branch, some with members of other Branches, some with our own members, and some towers have rung peals with their Sunday service band. Peals most outstanding were the peal of Bob Minor at Honiton on the Hill, a heavy ring that have defied all other peal attempts, and the peal of twenty-one doubles methods rung at Aylesbeare, this being the first of three peals to be rung on the same day.

Woodbury Band scored their first peal of Grandsire Doubles at Aylesbeare, this being without any outside help. It should not be long before they will be able to ring a peal of triples.

Membership at Clyst St. George has increased to seventeen, nine members being under the age of sixteen. The Captain, Mr. W. Wills, is to be congratulated on the way he has trained this band since the bells were recast after war damage less than two years ago.

Nearly all the ringers at Sowton now live outside the parish, but practice nights are well attended and service ringing maintained. Four members of the band are in the Forces. The band have rung two peals of Grandsire Triples and seven quarter peals, one of them being Kent Minor.

At Withycombe Raleigh the band have rung regularly for morning service and practice nights have been well attended, Stedman Triples and Plain Bob Major having been practised and progress made. Seven quarter peals of Grandsire Triples have been rung during the year. Miss S. Harvey is to be congratulated on gaining her certificate after nine months with the band, having had no previous experience of method ringing. The Summer outing was over Dartmoor and ringing was arranged at Buckland-in-the-Moor, Kingsbridge and Teignmouth. Ringing on New Year's Eve had to be missed for the first time in several years owing to members being ill.

All towers in the Branch, except Colaton Raleigh, where the bells are out of order, have maintained Sunday service ringing and practices on the whole have been well attended.

Some towers, however, although situated in residential areas, are short of recruits, and it is hoped that steps will be taken to remedy this, as without continual training of beginners no band can hope to maintain its strength and keep up its regular Sunday service ringing.

EXETER BRANCH.—The Exeter Branch reports a slight increase in membership which now stands at 115 as against 100 for 1953. Activities among bands are most encouraging; progress is reported from Brampford Speke, St. Marks, Newton St. Cyres, Ide and Thorverton. We welcome the new St. David's band to the Branch and wish them every success.

Despite repeated letters to Tedburn St. Mary no reply has been received so it must be assumed that they have withdrawn. This is much regretted as much time and effort has been expended there on instruction with disappointing results.

The Heavitree band have at last overcome post-war difficulties and are now ringing regularly for Sundays and practices.

In spite of the foregoing successes, Branch meetings and practices have been most disappointing from an attendance view-point. Members are requested to search their hearts and come to meetings with constructive criticism to allay the concern of the officers and to point out the reasons for this failure.

Peals have been rung in the Branch in honour of the 80th birthdays of Mr. C. G. Glass and Mr. E. J. Ryall, and wedding compliments to the Guild President and Branch Chairman. The best wishes of the Branch are most heartily extended to them.

The bells of most churches were rung at the request of the Archbishop on the home-coming of Her Majesty the Queen from the Commonwealth tour. Peals in honour were scored at St. Thomas and at Thorverton.

Our Chairman, the Rev. J. G. M. Scott, has now left the district. Our thanks are due to him for his services with us and we wish him every success in his new environment.

With regard to the future, this suggestion is submitted for members' serious consideration. We have now in the Branch the recruits and the material to build a strong element of change ringing. Instruction is urgently required at St. David's and St. Mark's, and assistance would be appreciated at other Branch towers. Could we visit at least one other practice weekly as well as our own?

Funds in the Instruction Account are available if required. If the Exercise is to flourish, members must be prepared to give of their time to instruct and encourage, and those willing to learn must also do their part in study and going where practice is to be had and not to expect an easy path to success.

Information about practice nights and times can be found in the Annual Report and the Hon. Secretary will be willing to advise if requested

EAST DEVON.—The Branch held three meetings during the year, and the attendance was very good, but could have been better. There seems to be a lack of interest in the meetings.

Performing members number 95, against 106 in 1953, which shows a slight decline, whilst two life members were elected during the year.

Feniton band are no longer members of the Branch.

Honiton band are very much alive. During the year they have rung one peal and quite a number of quarters, which goes to show they are keen.

The Branch has lost its oldest members during the year, Mr. John Wheaton. Jack, as he was known to all ringers, was an example—always at practice and service ringing. He will be missed in the Branch.

Financially the Branch is in a sound position, with a balance in the bank of £39 2s. 1d., £3 8s. 2d. more than in 1953.

NORTH-WEST DEVON.—We are once more pleased to report an increase in our membership from 33 to 38. The Annual Meeting was held at Bradworthy and the summer meeting at Holsworthy. Both were well attended and we were pleased to welcome visitors from all parts of the country. We are struggling to keep our practices going at Bridgerule, Stratton and Marhamchurch, but greatly miss our Ringing Master. Mr. F. Sangwin who has left the district. A farewell peal to him was rung at Week St. Mary in November.

On September 23rd several of our members took part in a Quarter Peal of Grandsire Triples at Holsworthy.

MID-DEVON BRANCH.—The most important event during the past year has been the Unveiling and Dedication of a handsome Peal Board at Totnes Parish Church, recording a peal of Grandsire Triples rung there during Coronation week, 1953. We are deeply indebted to Mr. George A. Harvey, of Totnes, for his generosity in meeting the cost, and we place on record our appreciation of his great kindness.

Meetings have been held at Babbacombe, Brixham, Rattery and Kingsteignton, as well as a Joint Meeting with the South-West Branch at Chudleigh, and an extra Meeting at Buckfast Abbey. The Rattery Meeting is worthy of mention, as it was a most enjoyable event.

Our Outing in 1954 was confined to our own Area.

Members elected during the year have been eight Associates and six Non-resident, the latter being the result of a very successful Ringing Week in South Devon during August Bank Holiday week, held by the St. Christopher's Guild of Ringers, Chichester, Sussex.

We again sincerely thank all Clergy who have allowed us the use of their Bells, also all members of this and other Branches for their continued and valuable support.

NORTH-EAST BRANCH.—The report of this, the North-East Branch, for 1954 is very encouraging.

During the year we have welcomed to the Guild as associate bands Uffculme and Kentisbeare, giving a membership of 78 performing members, many of whom are young ringers who must be encouraged to follow the Art of Scientific Change Ringing, and keep the Guild of Devonshire Ringers alive for many years.

Meetings have been held at Tiverton, Uffculme, Kentisbeare (the first visit by the Guild) and Huntsham. Attendances have been above average, more Branch members attending than at the previous year's meetings. Practices have been held at Bradninch and Uplowman for the tuition of learners.

The joint meeting with the Bath and Wells Association, Taunton Deanery, was at North Curry. The few Branch members who attended had a very enjoyable meeting with our friends across the border.

During the year Uffculme and Tiverton bands were privileged to broadcast. Co-operation with the B.B.C. was good and the effort was well worth while.

Sunday Service ringing and practices have been maintained in all Branch towers. Quarter peals have been rung in several; deserving of special mention is the one at Huntsham by the Sunday Service band. Silverton and Bradninch have spent much time on teaching young ringers of both sexes.

It is with regret we record the passing of the Rev. F. Carter, a past chairman of the Branch, also Mr. R. Harris, a past Secretary. The Branch was represented at the interment of these respected members and the bells of Calverleigh and Silverton, their home towers, were rung half muffled after the services.

Financially the Branch is on a very sound footing with a balance of some £41.

During the year we were glad to welcome to Silverton from Hampshire the Rev. W. S. Sanderson. At the induction service the Branch was represented by the Silverton Ringers and members of the Tiverton St. Peter's Society.

Our thanks are due to all Clergy who have so readily assisted us in many ways, and to all Branch officers for their co-operation and willing support.

NORTH DEVON.—There has been little change in the Branch during 1954 as no new members have been elected. We are very glad to welcome Mr. F. Sangwin to Combe Martin and look forward to his continued help.

Considerable progress is being made in method ringing as Stedman Triples and Bob Major are being practised regularly and plain courses are included in Sunday service ringing. The standard of striking is also improving but still needs careful attention.

We have received very considerable help from David Beacham, of Worcester Cathedral, now stationed at Chivenor R.A.F., who has been a welcome and regular ringer at Combe Martin, and from Norman Mallett when he has been able to get over from Barnstaple.

During the year four peals have been rung in North Devon, each including three or more members of the Branch. Of the fourteen members in the Branch only one has not yet rung a peal and eight have taken part in the peals this year. Four have rung their first peal, five their first of Minor and four their first of Major.

Three quarter peals have also been rung. One was of Bob Minor at West Down. Another, of Grandsire Doubles, was rung with great pleasure by an all local band in gratitude for the 21 years of service the President has given to the Guild. The third, of Grandsire Triples, was rung to mark the 50 years of service to Combe Martin Church of Mr. Alfred Willis as verger. Sunday service ringing has been regular throughout the year by all members of the Branch.

SOUTH-WEST BRANCH.—The outstanding event in the Branch during 1954 was the Guild's Annual meeting at Plymouth on Whit-Monday, when we were privileged to welcome ringers from all over the County and beyond.

Two other successful Branch meetings were held. One at Plympton St. Maurice and the other at Lamerton, while the joint meeting with the Mid-Devon Branch at Chudleigh on June 19th, was most enjoyable.

For reasons beyond our control the meeting to have taken place at Lamerton on October 2nd, 1954, had to be cancelled at such short notice that the secretary had no chance to arrange an alternative.

The financial position has never been better and our balance in hand now stands at £21 8s. 8d. in the general fund, and £3 6s. 0d. in the Instruction account.

We cannot give a glowing report on the ringing activities of the Branch. They have been mainly routine Sunday Service and practice meetings which, in the case of the three Plymouth towers (St. Andrew's, Emmanuel and Plympton St. Maurice) have been regular.

CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING, 1954

The Central Council meeting this year was in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and only the Rev. J. G. M. Scott was able to make the very long journey there to represent the Guild.

The meeting was held on June 8th in the Cathedral Library, and began with addresses of welcome from the Lord Mayor and the Bishop and Provost of Newcastle. Getting down to business, the Council re-elected all its officers, Mr. E. H. Lewis as President, Mr. E. A. Barnett as Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr. F. Sharpe as Librarian, all these to serve for the coming three years. Most of the Committees were re-elected, except for the Literature, Press and Broadcasting Committee,

which was re-constituted, and a separate Committee for Broadcasting and Television set up. All reports were adopted, except for one paragraph of the report of the Peals Analysis Committee, which erased twelve peals of Plain Bob Triples from the Peals Analysis. This matter was stood over for further discussion next year, and it is probable that a motion will be brought before the Council to clarify, once and for all, the position and eligibility of this method.

The other most controversial matter was that of the decision of the Editorial Committee to forbid the publication in the "Ringing World" of letters written under a nom-de-plume. After much argument, it was decided to make the Editorial Committee entirely responsible for all letters published in the paper, with power to refuse any letters liable to cause unpleasantness, whether under an assumed name or not.

It was once more urged on all members of the Council that the "Ringing World" is in a very precarious position financially, and that we need more postal subscribers if it is to pay its way. All representatives were asked to do their best to encourage members of their Associations to subscribe to the "Ringing World," and it is to be hoped that some more postal subscribers will be forthcoming from the Guild of Devonshire Ringers.

The last business before the meeting was the carrying, unanimously, of a motion deprecating the use of synthetic bells and recordings in church towers and turrets.

After the meeting the members of the Council were most nobly entertained at a Civic Reception by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress of Newcastle, and were made very welcome in several towers by the Durham and Newcastle Association. Your representative returned with the good wishes of ringers from every part of the kingdom to the Guild of Devonshire Ringers, which he takes this opportunity of passing on.
