## General Secretary

Guild activities were confined to virtual meetings using teleconferencing services during the first months of 2021 because we were unable to meet physically. A varied program of events was held online including training, talks and a virtual beer festival. Up to the end of May our members and invited guests had collectively used 140,986 minutes ( 98 days) of time on the Zoom virtual platform. We were not able to meet to hold our Guild Annual General Meeting in Tiverton, but I was delighted when it became possible for us to begin ringing more normally for services and at practice nights in July.

Following consultation with branch and tower leaders it was decided to go ahead with the Guild 6 -bell striking competition at Laira on 16th October. Five teams took part and a number of those present tried their hand at marking competition ringing as part of a listening skills workshop which was running simultaneously. During the autumn I've been really pleased to be able to ring with some of you again at your branch Annual General Meeting and also to attend a couple of the Young Ringer practices during the latter half of the year. This newly revitalised group shows promise and I hope that more of our younger ringers will join in as we prepare to host the Ringing World National Youth Contest in Exeter on 2nd July. I look forward to seeing many of you during 2022.

## Bells and Belfries Advisors

Again, due to Covid restrictions the activities of the Guild Bell Advisors were somewhat restricted during 2021, though we have ventured out a bit more this year.

In May a post-lockdown inspection was carried out at Broadhembury to ensure that the bells could be rung for a forthcoming wedding, only to find that the bell chamber had been invaded by jackdaws - a salutary lesson to regularly inspect the integrity of the mesh over your sound-exit louvres and to carry out any necessary repairs immediately.

In June a comprehensive inspection was carried out at Musbury, another former Guild tower, and in October a follow-up visit was made to Yarnscombe on behalf of the DCBRF. Finally, in December, an inspection was carried out at St Peter's, Tiverton, to advise on any issues needing to be addressed during major maintenance planned to coincide with the centenary of the bells in 2023.

Verbal advice has been provided to Crediton, Hatherleigh, Newton St Cyres and Princetown, brief visits also being made to both Crediton and Princetown.

Work has been completed by the professional bell hangers during the year at Axminster, Dunkeswell, Pilton and Shaugh Prior, and is currently under way at Butterleigh, Cadbury, Denbury, East Anstey and Milton Abbot, and is about to commence at Bigbury.

As ever, may we emphasize that we are always happy to visit any Guild tower (current restrictions permitting) to report on the condition of the bell installation and to offer advice on any maintenance or restoration issue. No charge is made for these visits.

## Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund (Charity Number 276490)

During 2021 the Fund has been actively involved with 14 towers at some stage in their restoration projects. In addition to these, a further eight towers have requested grant application forms, though have not as yet completed and submitted them. With the easing of coronavirus restrictions, we have been able to restart our quinquennial bell inspections and this year have carried out a long overdue inspection at Musbury. We also paid a return visit to Yarnscombe, following up our quinquennial of 2016. Inspections of completed restoration work have been carried out at Axminster, Shaugh Prior, Pilton and Dunkeswell.

Due to the restrictions then in force, our March meeting was conducted using the "Zoom" facility, whereas we reverted to our normal face-to-face format for our November meeting. Later in

November the Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary and Secretary-elect met with our financial advisors to review recent performance of our investment portfolio and to discuss future strategy.

One major change in our ranks is that James, having resigned as Consultant on Bells and Clocks to the Exeter DAC at the beginning of the year, chaired his last meeting in March and has now been replaced by his successor, the change formally taking place on 1st July. Furthermore, the secretary, Ian, expressed a wish to stand down from that position and will be replaced by Janet early in the new year.

The trustees have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. The aim of the Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund remains to provide financial assistance to churches in the County of Devon and Diocese of Exeter for the purpose of restoring, maintaining and improving their bell installations, so as to ensure their continuing use both for religious purposes and for the ongoing development of the cultural art of English church bell ringing. Though bells are housed predominantly in premises of the Church of England the practice of church bell ringing is open to all regardless of age, creed or culture; and being a very public instrument may be heard by all.

The bulk of our financial assets remain in the form of an investment portfolio purchased from the William Smale Bequest, and continue to be managed through the Discretionary Portfolio Service of Cathedral Financial Management Ltd of Exeter, the value of the portfolio as at 31st December 2021 standing at $£ 361,840$, having almost regained its value prior to the covid lock-down. The continuing benefit of the investment portfolio is in the dividends received which have amounted to $£ 8,095$ for the year. As was to be expected, this was significantly less (by about 40 per cent) than the income received pre-Covid, and it is difficult to see this recovering in the immediate future.

A significant portion of our income normally comes as a result of the activities of the two Devon ringing societies. Clearly, on account of the continuing Covid restrictions, this was anticipated to be much reduced, as has indeed been the case. Though activities have been gradually increasing, it is difficult to see income from this area getting back to anything like normal for some considerable time. The trustees have therefore continued to take initiatives to offset this, and again a PowerPoint presentation highlighting the work of the DCBRF was made prior to the 'virtual' Devon Ringers' Carol Service in December. Members of the two societies have again been encouraged to use AmazonSmile for their on-line purchases, nominating the DCBRF as their chosen charity. Also, the links on both societies web-pages to the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) Donate service have proved quite lucrative.

At the beginning of 2021 the liquid assets of the Fund stood at $£ 59,479$. Since that time five grants totalling $£ 7,950$ have been paid. $£ 1,200$ went to Ermington for cleaning down and descaling the sub-frame and repairing where necessary, and repainting all the frame ironwork and fittings; $£ 900$ to Shaugh Prior for sand-blasting and galvanising some of the frame's cross-bracing, repainting the rest of the frame, sub-frame and headstocks, re-facing the clappers and repairing the cracked bell-pad on the fourth bell; $£ 950$ to Axminster for overhauling the bearings, re-profiling the clappers and fitting new hinge pins and bushes, new pulley sheaves for the third and tenor bells, and new runner boards for the treble, second and third bells; $£ 3,000$ to Pilton towards cleaning down and repainting the bell-frame and support grillage, repairs to the treble, seventh and tenor clappers, removal of old crown staple stumps, servicing the bearings, sliders and runner boards, and turning the second and fourth bells; and $£ 1,900$ to Dunkeswell for descaling, treating and painting the beam ends of the frame foundation and inserting new padstones, also improving the access to the ringing room and bell chamber. Income during the year (excluding that from the investment portfolio) has amounted to $£ 7,520$, including $£ 4,212$ from the Guild and its Branches, $£ 395$ from Devon Association towers, $£ 919$ via the CAF Donation Buttons, $£ 1,400$ from other donations and fundraising, and $£ 425$ from tax refunds and bank interest.

Having taken off administration expenses, the liquid assets of the Fund currently stand at $£ 66,930$. Grants agreed this year include the $£ 950$ to Axminster (as mentioned above); $£ 6,250$ to Bigbury towards a complete rehang of the six bells in the existing frame, but on completely new and re-positioned supporting grillages; $£ 5,300$ to SS Philip and James, Ilfracombe towards rehanging the eight bells with new or refurbished fittings in the existing strengthened bell-frames, the upper frame being provided with new steel support beams; and $£ 8,100$ to Hatherleigh for
rehanging the bells in a new steel frame. (At Hatherleigh, as part of a major church re-ordering scheme, a new ringing floor will be provided some eleven feet higher in the tower which, together with an improved rope circle, will make the bells far easier to ring.). Assuming that all of the agreed grants are taken up, the uncommitted liquid balance of the Fund stands at $£ 13,980$.

## Denmisch Simulator

Ian and Oliver inspected the Denmisch simulator on Sunday 9/1/22. There has been no ringing here since early 2020. It was positive to re-establish contact with the Cathedral School staff. Since we last used the facility the room has been redecorated and the rather tired metal lockers removed, The space is now being used as a locker and gown room for choristers rather than a Year 8 locker room and generally feels more wholesome, but still poorly ventilated by its intrinsic nature. A framed pealboard and a framed picture will be rehung by the school handymen. Both the PC and laptop failed to function. lan has removed them and if he is unable to revive them has a supply of possible replacements. Thank you lan. Without the computers it was not possible to tell whether the sensors, wiring and speaker are all functional. The display screen and webcam are both working. All simulators were rung up. A broken stay was identified and replaced. Pulleys on all simulators were seized up, possibly a result of damp (pulleys are part housed in MDF) although in other respects, functionally and visually, the installation appears in good condition. Ropes are slightly stiff but functional.

To do list:

- Mend / replace computers
- Return visit to check sensors, wiring and speaker
- Free pulleys somehow. Ian to think about pulleys, perhaps contact David to find out best way of freeing them.
- Consider some form of timed heating / dehumidifying in belfry
- Oliver to re-establish contact with the Headmaster regarding access, the possible resumption of an after school club and use of the facility during the National Youth Competition. We currently have access to the Belfry but not the ringing room from Bear Street.


## Devon Ringers' Council

Due to the continuing Covid pandemic and along with thousands of other events being cancelled up and down the country, the 10-bell call-change competition for the second year in succession did not take place. The 2022 competition is planned to take place on 23rd April.

The Carol Service however, and again, for the second year in succession, did take place via the zoom facility. Many people worked extremely hard once again in putting this service together and are all to be congratulated with the result.

The DRC held it's only meeting of the year in February. The main item on the agenda related to future Church closures where bells are concerned and how to ensure satisfactory negotiations are in place to deal with such sad endings. Various key people were invited to this meeting and a satisfactory conclusion was reached in which the DRC are to be notified of future closures and to be fully involved in any necessary negotiations.

If anyone wishes a topic to be included on our agenda for discussion, please let me know.

## Devon Young Ringers

Devon Young Ringers began meeting monthly at Pinhoe in August 2021. Pinhoe was selected as an easy, ground floor ring of 8 in a central location to Devon. It has been great for the Young Ringers events as there is plenty of parking, the church and tower is easy to ventilate to comply with COVID regulations. The number of young ringers at practices has varied between 6 and 4 . There are 10 ringers in total who have attended at least one Young Ringers Practice.

The focus for 2022 will be to reach more young people in Devon. We are aware that a number of ringers are unable to make the Sunday afternoon slot, so we are in the process of arranging additional events such as outings, run during half term breaks for example, to help catch those who cannot make the regular sessions.

The Modern Society of Plymouth Youths has currently a good cohort of university aged ringers who are willing to help support practices and run outings, extending invitations to the Devon Young

Ringers group. There is also opportunity to link up with Young Ringing activities happening in Truro. Young Ringers in Devon will receive personal invites to these events as well as reminders of the monthly practices.

With the RW National Youth Contest coming to Exeter this year, we hope to be able to raise at least one team to enter the competition. This will need a focused approach such as additional practices targeted to the selected team. Young Ringers in Devon (regardless of their attendance to young ringers practices so far) will be asked to complete a questionnaire which will give us an idea of when to run these practices and how much interest we might have in raising a band. I would be grateful if branch representatives could look out for this and distribute to young ringers in their areas. The monthly practices will continue through 2022, on the 2nd Sunday of the month from
$2-4 \mathrm{pm}$. All abilities are welcome, we have young ringers who are just learning to handle a bell right up to ringers who have rung peals and the mixture of abilities creates a nice environment where the young people can support one another. Our sessions are a chance for young ringers to meet one another and make new friends, and to push themselves in a friendly and nurturing environment. The sessions have helped many of them to progress outside of their comfort zones.

The budget for Young Ringers Events has been spent on tower donations to Pinhoe, refreshments for the practices, and gifts for the young ringers at our Christmas party - each young ringer received a '50 Ringing Things' book from ART. Through 2022, much of the expenses will be similar, although may also include additional expenses related to raising a band such as producing team T-shirts.

## Frank Mack Garage Ring

In normal times the bells are now well established as being a popular fund-raising attraction and for general recruiting of lapsed or new ringers. With thousands of events cancelled up and down the country once again because of the continuing uncertainties surrounding the Covid pandemic, the bells have not been used during 2021. They were booked on occasions but government guidelines coming out immediately prior to an event meant these sadly had to be cancelled at the last minute. As many of you know, the bells being so light often prove to be problematical initially even for experienced ringers but apart from the fun side of this ring, it has in previous years proved to be of unmeasured success in getting potential learners into a tower near them. Long may this continue. The lightness of the bells and therefore quite an unrealistic comparison with tower bells, does not appear to put people off having a go. Indeed, there is a greater sense of achievement having conquered something so tricky. A visual plus for potential learners is being able to see both the bell and ringer simultaneously and therefore perhaps grasping a speedier understanding of what one is attempting to achieve.

Our main annual event at the Devon County Show had a disappointing outcome for us in that the Devon Churches stand, of which we were part of, had a change in style and presentation and therefore we didn't have a place in which to set-up. Negotiations are taking place to have a separate stand-alone position at the DCS and to visit other shows around the county.

## Guild Librarian

COVID restrictions continued to prevent the Library operating normally in the first half of 2021, but nevertheless there is plenty to report.

The collection at St Petrock's, Exeter. During maintenance visits in the early part of the year a problem with dampness in one of the cupboards housing our books was discovered. This has been kept under control with the use of dehumidifier packs and is being monitored. It emphasises the need for the collection cupboards to be opened and aired regularly.

Regular openings to members resumed in July. Through the good offices of the Rector, we now have internet access in the Library, courtesy of the St Petrock's Centre. Our grateful thanks go to the Rev'd Sheila Swarbrick for her enthusiastic support of our occupation of St. Petrock's. We only pay for hiring the facility for the hours we open the Library and in return have excellent facilities. This includes the small chancel area which can be used by Guild or Branch officers for small meetings during Library opening times.

Acquisitions and Usage. A festival was held in July celebrating the 200th anniversary of Ellacombe chimes. The Commemorative book of the bicentenary, 1821-2021 by the Bitton Parish History Group has been purchased for the Library. Opportunities to fill gaps also arise from time to time. David Cressy's book Bonfire and bells: National memory and the Protestant calendar in Elizabethan and Stuart England was originally published in 1989 and is now out of print. We were pleased to find a reasonably-price secondhand copy to fill the gap in our collection. Describing how the ringing of church bells played a major part in popular civic celebrations in late medieval England, it has many Devon references. The author catalogue of the Library was updated in September, is available on the Guild website and now runs to 32 A4 pages, showing just how extensive and rich our collection is.

We are grateful to Lynne, Brian, John and Trevor for their donations to the collection. We were especially pleased to receive Lynne's specially-prepared photobook of Devon Young Ringers, 20062014 and Trevor's Combe Raleigh Bell Project: a short history. Enquiries and loans were inevitably rduced during the year, but still ran at one every two months.

Devon Ringing History. These latter two donations emphasise the importance of recording and preserving Devon's ringing history. We suggested in the year that towers and branches send the Library their records of activity (or the lack of it) during the COVID pandemic. We are still open for contributions describing the alternative activities run by groups in the last 21 months in what has been an "unprecedented" period for ringing since the Second World War.

Two important manuscript items came to light early in the year. We have several copies of Troyte's Change Ringing and, sorting through duplicate copies in Tiverton, we were about to put a fifth copy on the disposal pile when we found two letters. The first was from the son of Troyte's printer in Exeter, explaining how all the remaining copies and the printing plates for Change Ringing were destroyed in enemy action in WW2. The second was from a friend of Dorothy L. Sayers, explaining some of the background to the writing of The Nine Tailors. Both are now available to read on the Devon Ringing History page of the Guild website.

## Guild Striking Competition

During the afternoon members were also offered the chance to develop listening skills and find out about what is involved in judging a striking contest.

We were delighted that Tim (Guild Education Officer) agreed to facilitate this opportunity, which begun with an introductory talk. Tim described some things you might listen for, offered tips on making constructive observations, and introduced various systems you might employ to assess the accuracy of the striking.

There was then the opportunity to listen to performances of the teams competing in the intertower striking contest for the JP Fidler Cup, and to have a go at marking and taking notes on them with no pressure. In a relaxed and sociable format, members of competing teams were also able to have a go at assessing one another's performances and reviewing their own.

## Ringing Recruitment Workgroup

The Guild Recruitment Workgroup has so far held two meetings, one on the 11th December 2021 and one on the 8th January 2022. The workgroup consists of 6 Guild members, representing four branches, and it is being helped and supported by Guild Education Officer Tim. The unrepresented branches have been encouraged to send a representative to the workgroup but no further members have beenforthcoming.

## Decisions of Workgroup

The key decision of the workgroup is to develop a continuous and regular model of recruitment, which will be administered at branch level. The model can be tailored to meet the needs and respond to the local conditions of each branch, with the aim of recruiting a manageable number of new ringers every year. It was noted that whilst recruitment campaigns such as Ringing Remembers can be very successful, they are also very time-consuming and the amount of work involved can lead to burn-out among teachers. Such campaigns are then often followed by several years of little or no active recruitment, with the result that recruitment lurches from peaks to troughs and the lack of ringers remains a problem in the long-term.

It is recognised that teaching usually falls on the shoulders of tower captains and a few other experienced ringers. In order to implement a continuous recruitment model successfully, there is therefore also a need to recruit and support new teachers.

## Ringing Round Devon Newsletter

While COVID restrictions have remained in force and many towers are not ringing regularly the decision was taken (in conjunction with the Guild Secretary and Treasurer) to continue without printed copies of RRD, producing only the Internet version which can be downloaded (and printed if required) by members and non-members. Anyone who has taken out a subscription for printed copies will have their payment held over until printed copies are produced.

Issues have been produced for March (18 pages), June (19 pages), September (19 pages) and December (14 pages). The observant among you will notice that these are no longer constrained to a multiple of four pages, a requirement that is only needed for printed copies.

I am very grateful to all those who continue to send in articles of various types. Special thanks go, as always, to the Report Secretary who does the page layout and produces the final version.

## Report Secretary

After discussions with members of the committee it was agreed to produce a printed report, as well as a redacted on-line version, combining the 2019 and 2020 Annual Reports. A few sample pages were produced and approved, with the branch secretaries being asked to submit tower reports for 2020, these being added to the existing 2019 Report (which was only published as a redacted version on-line).

The Guild Secretary polled members to gauge how many people would be happy with just an online version, and those who would prefer a printed copy, with a total of 200 copies were printed. With the number of Quarter peals and Peals being down from the two previous years, and a new format used, it was possible to reduce the number of pages down to 64 thereby achieving a reduction in printed costs. This saving, over the two years, is reflected in the Accounts for 2019 and 2020. As the numbers of Quarters and Peals will be down again for 2021 the number of pages will be less than usual and we will be printing copies for those who ask for them, with a redacted version available on the Guild website. We could also consider sending an unredacted copy to those who would like an electronic version via e-mail.

## Webmaster

During 2021 the website received an average of 65 (up from 41 in 2020) page views per day. The breakdown of page views is shown below for the 10 most visited pages:

Total hits on the website are back up to pre-pandemic levels with the towers, newsletters and the subscription form taking the top spots for number of page views. The Ringing Recovery primary page had 384 page views (11th in the most visited list) so members were hopefully using the resources made available.

At the beginning of the year all branch treasurers were allocated an email address to ensure potentially sensitive information received from members is kept secure. In September an email address was created to be used by the group organising the 150th anniversary events.

In May the analytics system was upgraded to v4 of Google Analytics.
The Aylesbeare branch and East Devon branch email lists were created in April and the NNW branch email list in May, all of them using data received from the member subscription forms. Other branches took the opportunity to update the membership of their lists using the collected information.

The issue with sending to Plusnet hosted domains was resolved by Plusnet in April. Our domain had been blocked by them. It took a long time to convince them that the issue was with their system. If anyone wants help or guidance with email lists, email addresses or the website then please get in touch.

## Treasurer

## Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2021

The General Fund shows a surplus of $£ 1,980.47$ (2020: $£ 2,094.58$ ). We have seen a decline in members which has led to a reduction in our subscription income.

The Zoom account was well used in the first six months of the year, however on reviewing the use of the Zoom account for the remainder of 2021, this no longer appears to be value-for-money, so we stopped our subscription in mid-January 2022. If we need to hold a large meeting a one-off payment can be made.

Following a review of the insurance policy we were advised to add Employees liability insurance to the policy which will provide insurance cover for volunteers. This has resulted in an increase to the annual cost.

The Guild library, housed in St Petrock's, Exeter, was open for several sessions during the year. We would normally expect to pay $£ 240$ each year for the monthly access to the library. The Library Fund is making a transfer of $£ 90$ to the General Fund to help cover these costs.

The Bell Restoration Fund shows a total of $£ 3,827.58$ ( 2020 : $£ 4,358.60$ ) was raised for the DCBRF. This includes the transfer from the General Fund of $£ 1,625$ agreed at the June 2021 AGM. Members have donated generously to the Guild Bell Restoration Fund through the subscription process and because more members have completed the Gift Aid declaration on the subscription form, we are able to claim more funds back from HMRC than ever before.

At the June AGM, we agreed financial support to Young Ringers Activities for the twelve months through to June 2022. Activities commenced in August with a monthly practice held at Pinhoe. Costs include the tower donations; a kit box containing items such as a first aid kit, hand sanitiser, stationery, refreshments and so on; and the cost of travel from Plymouth for the practice leaders, which is matched by a donation. The remainder of the $£ 500$ transfer agreed at June 2021 AGM will be utilised in the period up to the June 2022 AGM.

There has been no movement on the Instruction and Education Fund and a donation of $£ 5$ to the Denmisch Fund. The Library Fund collected $£ 106$ in subscriptions and donations.

Assets held by the Guild at 31 December 2021 were $£ 9,261.37$ (2020: $£ 8,977.85$ ) with the General Fund balance standing at $£ 8,255.33$ (2020: $£ 8,309.86$ ).

Last year I noted that we should consider how we can use some of our reserves to improve the health of ringing once we emerge from the Covid 19 crisis.

I therefore propose the following:

- a transfer of $£ 90.25$ to top the Education Fund up to $£ 500$;
- a transfer to the Young Ringers Fund of $£ 500$ to support activities to June 2023;
- a transfer to the Bell Restoration Fund of $£ 2,035$ which I hope will help to boost funds in the DCBRF's $50^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary Year.

Thank you to all Guild members for your help and support in achieving these results which mean we have a healthy level of reserves to invest in ringing.

BROADCLYST St. John the Baptist. 8 bells, tenor 20cwt, grid ref. SX982973.
Sundays: by arrangement.
Service ringing relies on the support of ringers from other towers so may vary from month to month but usually on the third and/or fourth Sunday of the month. A single bell was tolled to mark the passing of HRH the Duke of Edinburgh. The tower hosted one visiting band and three peals were rung during the year.

CLYST HONITON St Michael \& All Angels, 8 bells, tenor 19cwt, grid ref. SX989935.
Sunday: 9.30am (2nd) Ringing by arrangement.
We are back ringing for the 2nd Sunday morning service with the help from neighbouring towers in the branch.

CLYST ST GEORGE St George, 6 bells, tenor 10cwt, grid ref. SX984889.
Sunday: 10.30 am (4th only). Practice by arrangement.
Now the services have settled down within the Mission, we are managing to ring for the monthly morning service with help from other towers. The branch came here for our AGM in October and two quarter peals were rung by branch members in October and December.

LITTLEHAM St Margaret, 8 bells, tenor 7cwt, grid ref. SY029813.
Sunday: 9.30 am . Practice: Monday 7.30 pm (by arrangement).
We rang three bells on Easter Sunday and from then on Sunday ringing was two or three, occasionally one until the summer holidays. In September one of my '2019 improvers' went off to college but has continued ringing but the other decided not to continue and my learners were no longer interested. Since then, one bell is regularly chimed on Sundays and were grateful for a team from Lancashire who rang one Sunday morning during their visit to Devon.

On Christmas Day, with a former member returning, we only rang three bells. Sadly, our previous Captain, Neville Wright died in October and due to larger numbers than could be accommodated at Littleham his funeral was held in a church without bells though we tolled the appropriate number for him at Littleham before the service. Quarter Peals were also rung by Aylesbeare branch members at Littleham and Clyst St George in Neville's memory. I was grateful to ringers from Withycombe Raleigh who helped me fulfil the request for a ring of muffled bells at the funeral of Revd Margaret in September.

LYMPSTONE Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, 6 bells, tenor 12cwt, grid ref. SX993842. Sunday: 9:30am. Practice: Wednesday 7:30pm.
We have, with some help from Withycombe ringers, been able to ring for most services that have taken place. Our three learners are progressing well. Holly is now able to ring call changes and will soon be working on raising and lowering though she is taking a break from ringing for a few weeks
to give birth to what we hope will be one of the next generation of ringers. Jeff is ringing rounds and can raise and lower a bell (not in peal) and is working on call changes. Alison, who started later, is learning to handle a bell and will soon be ringing rounds. I hope to propose all three for Guild membership very soon. We have often struggled to ring 5 bells in the last year but look forward to better times ahead.

SOWTON St Michael \& All Angels, 8 bells, tenor 9cwt, grid ref. SX97692.
Sunday: 6.00pm (1st and 3rd).
Ringing restarted for the fortnightly evening services late in the year, limiting the ringing to six bells to achieve adequate spacing in the very cramped ringing chamber. The regular support from ringers in our mission community and local area is invaluable and keeps the bells at Sowton rung, thanks to you all.

TOPSHAM St Margaret, 6 bells, tenor 10cwt, grid ref. SX965880.
Sunday: 9.30am. Practice: Thursday 7.30pm.
We started 2021 meeting virtually and by March, we were allowed one ringer or family back in the tower which allowed Keith and Daniel to ring a couple of bells for Sunday service. For Easter Sunday, a group of us got together to ring handbells outside the church which was well received by both the parishioners and the ringers so we began to meet regularly outside on a Thursday night for handbells. In April came the sad news of the death of the Duke of Edinburgh and the tenor was tolled on a number of occasions to mark this event. By mid-May, we were able to ring together back in the tower, initially with only four ringers. On the 26th June, we were very proud to take part in the international celebrations for the 100th anniversary of the invention of the Ellacombe chimes, ours having been installed by the Revd Ellacombe himself. We entertained a small crowd outside the church during the afternoon, playing tunes, call changes and methods on our chimes.

We were very pleased to finally be able to ring all six bells for the patronal festival on the 18th July, a day of great celebration with a confirmation service led by the Bishop of Exeter and in August a ringer's tea was held to catch up with ringers and their families. Later in August, we also rang for two local events; firstly, 14 year old Katie sailed back into Topsham completing her bid to become the youngest person to sail single handed around Britain, and at the end of the month, we rang for Topsham Charter Day, now a regular event in the town and ringing calendar. We rang out for climate change at the end of October and for Remembrance in November. Amongst ringing for the Christmas services, we took the opportunity to commemorate the first peal in the tower (24/12/1921) and rang a centenary peal on the 23rd December with the help of Neil and Janet and previous Topsham ringer, Harry. This was a first peal for Daniel as well as for Harry and was Neil's first as conductor. A great achievement all round. We ended the year in traditional fashion by ringing in the New Year.

I was drafted away with work in September, therefore, I can only make occasional practice nights at present so I must thank Keith in particular for running the tower so ably in my absence. As ever my thanks to all of the band for their support and enthusiasm, particularly over the past couple of years.

WITHYCOMBE RALEIGH St John the Evangelist, 12 bells, tenor 17cwt, grid ref. SY008818. Sunday: 9.30am. Practice: Monday 7.30pm.
With the gradual easing of Covid restrictions, we provided occasional and then more regular service ringing for Sunday mornings and held weekly closed practices on Mondays. Although the Exeter Cathedral Band usually practice here on alternate months, this was suspended until all restrictions had been removed. No weddings took place but we are hopeful these will return. During the year significant events were marked by our tower: in February, Janet tolled the tenor 100 times in memory of centenarian Capt. Sir Tom Moore, on the day of his funeral, in April Roger tolled the tenor 99 times in memory of HRH Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, who died the previous day and in December, a peal was rung to celebrate the 70th birthday of lan, recording a first on 10 for Mark; in April a virtual quarter peal was rung in Ringing Room in celebration of the
life of Mary Mack, Vice President of GDR, former tower Treasurer and who contributed so much to the ringing at Withycombe Raleigh. Oliver has become a regular Sunday visitor which makes a huge difference to what we are able to ring.

WOODBURY St Swithin, 8 bells, tenor 23cwt, grid ref. SY009872. Sunday: 1st: $10.30 \mathrm{am}, 3 \mathrm{rd}: 5.45 \mathrm{pm}$, 4th 9.45 am , 5 th: check for details. Practice by arrangement.
Until May, ringing in 2021 was largely performed on the Ellacombe chimes, with the exception of a Coldrick family bubble for Easter day. Since May we have ventured back up the tower and rung at least five bells for a total of 26 services and 2 weddings. All regular ringers have returned at some point, though not all at the same time. Another two have now joined the choir, bringing the total of singing ringers to five and leaving us a bit thin immediately before service. We were pleased to welcome Catherine, a ready-made ringer who recently moved from Newcastle who we hope has no choral ambitions! ## Deaneries of Honiton and Ottery

Unfortunately, no Branch meetings were held during 2021. Our AGM in February was held via email communication. As a result of the restrictions we have lost members who have found other interests in the meantime and after several years of struggle Talaton resigned from the Branch. We hope for good ringing opportunities in 2022 and some new ringers to join with us.

AWLISCOMBE St Michael \& All Angels, 6 bells, tenor 19 cwt, grid ref. ST133018. Sunday 9.00-9.30am (1st and 3rd). Practice Tuesday 7.30pm. (alternate with Buckerell).
We've had no ringing for almost two years now which leaves nothing to report.
AXMINSTER St Mary, 10 bells, tenor 23 cwt, grid ref. SY296984.
Sunday: 10.15 am -11.00am. Practice: Monday 7.30pm.
Throughout 2021 we continued to ring the bells as often as we could whilst remaining within the varying guidelines; for most of the year ringing our front six for Sunday services. Our connection with the local community remains strong and we were delighted to be asked to ring for a number of town events. We were looking forward to hosting the Devon Ringers' 10 bell call change competition in April, but this was postponed. During the year we lost several regular ringers and gained three experienced ringers who moved into Axminster, bringing our regular Sunday band number to seven. 2022 has started with a recruitment campaign to bolster our numbers, this is going well. Mothering Sunday, Easter and the Carol service all lacked bells, and our newest ringer lost their confidence during the enforced break so gave up. However, we did manage to resume practice ringing with our friends from Awliscombe and Offwell, rang for a joyous wedding and had a special ring for Remembrance on half muffled bells. The Troyte Ringing Centre (TRC) is the registered charity responsible for ringing the tower bells at Bampton and at Huntsham within the terms of written agreements between the TRC and each Parochial Church Council. The TRC trustees are Leslie, Mandy, Jenny, Michael and Sheila.
BAMPTON St. Michael and All Angels, 6 bells, tenor 14 cwt, grid ref. SS957222, Postcode EX16 9QJ. Sundays: 10.15am (except 4th). General ringing: Thursdays 7 30-9.00pm.
HUNTSHAM All saints, 8 bells, tenor 8 cwt , grid ref. ST001204. Postcode EX16 7NA.
Sundays: 08.45am (4th only).
Ringing: In the earlier part of the year ringing was limited to a single bell at Bampton before Sunday services and on Thursday evenings for the N.H.S. Once restrictions eased in May a rota of six ringers rang for Sunday services at both churches and weekly peals resumed at Huntsham.

Thursday night practices restarted at Bampton from November and ringing for weddings also restarted in the summer. Inevitably, training events and the After School Bell Club had to be suspended for the year, but a bell maintenance workshop led by Chris Cozens was held in Tiverton in December.

Tower Maintenance: Much work was done this year. At Bampton a mechanical ventilation system was installed to address a long-standing problem in the ringing room. This is supplemented by an air purifier to reduce the risk of COVID infection. Dr. David, adviser to the Central Council, came in April to conduct CO2 test measurements and these showed that the system is effective in changing the air in the ringing room. The installation made it necessary to improve the electricity supply to the tower and new external and emergency lights were fitted. The floor of the ringing room was sanded and resealed.

At Huntsham Nicholson Engineering did work on the clappers and main bearings in the spring assisted by volunteer TRC members. Headstocks were also painted, and the wood floor of the bell chamber treated.

People: Three ringers have been lost to the band through moves away from the area and three others had yet to return to ringing at the end of the year. Inevitably this has impacted on our ringing, but all ringing commitments were met. Pat and Richard stood down as trustees and the Chairmanship of the charity passed from Mike to Les. We thank those who have relinquished office for their work and support for the TRC.

Fundraising: TRC ringers supported an August Bank Holiday fundraising event for Christian Aid by parachuting teddy bears form the top of Bampton tower. A coffee morning for TRC funds was held in September, and a small regular income is received from Easyfundraising through online purchases made by members.

BICKLEIGH St Mary the Virgin, 6 bells, tenor 8cwt, grid ref. SS942071, Postcode EX16 8RD. Sunday: 10.30am every 3rd Sunday.
We have rung for a couple of weddings and have entertained four visiting teams in 2021. Unfortunately, we have lost our small band of dedicated ringers. There are one or two villagers keen to learn so we are hoping to build up again as 2022 progresses.

During 2021 Ellacombe Chimes were rung for Sunday Services and occasional weddings, until September when we were able to resume full circle Sunday ringing on a few bells. Practice nights resumed mid-November, along with information leaflets to church neighbours regarding practice times and fundraising for volume control and simulator equipment (for training purposes). This also resulted in media features on BBC Radio Devon, BBC Spotlight and interest from potential new ringers! Christmas ringing for the Donkey Services, Carol Service and Christmas Day rounded off our year.

CULMSTOCK All Saints, 8 bells, Tenor 18.02.00, grid ref. ST102135, Postcode EX15 3JD. Sunday: 9.15am for 10.00 am service. Practice: 7.15 pm on the last Wednesday of the month.
We have again rung all eight bells with our own band for Christmas, Easter, Remembrance and weddings, and with help from Hemyock for combined Mission Community services, but usually only six on other Sundays. Our regular band is now, after a long struggle, able to ring well-struck plain hunt doubles. Visiting parties are generally welcome, including for quarter peals, but a full peal during 2019 did lead to a complaint, despite advance publicity, and we are inclined to refuse further requests out of consideration for our neighbours. 2022 We are, as others, back to ringing regularly.

HALBERTON St Andrew, 6 bells, Tenor 17 cwt, grid ref. ST005128, Postcode EX16 7AR.
We started ringing again in October with our 3 towers taking turns to host. We have 2 new D of E teenagers learning with us. One is using ringing as a service for 3 months, the other a skill for 6 months. Both girls are doing very well and are ringing rounds and starting call changes.

HEMYOCK St Marys, 6 bells, Tenor 17-3-12 in E, grid ref: ST136133, Postcode EX15 3RA. Ringing Sunday normally 10.15am. 5th Sunday: On a rota with Clayhidon, Culmstock and Culm Day. Patronal festivals may also change the rota, so it is advisable to phone and check. The same applies to practice night which is usually Thursday at 7.45 pm .
Like many towers Hemyock had an unusual time during 2021. When gathering was permitted we did have a slight advantage in having 3 doors into the ringing room so we did not have any problems with ventilation, just got chilled. The Covid outbreak though did affect both the more elderly members of our band and also the congregation we serve, so ringing four or five for a service became more usual than we would like it to be. But we did keep ringing, missing only one service. After many date changes, we rang for a wedding too!

One thing which also happened towards the end of the year was our PCC's decision to start the preparatory investigations for the work needed in the tower. The work had been agreed before Covid struck but paused whilst we all isolated. So we have begun the long trawl through builders, bellhangers, funders etc. It won't be quick, but we hope to have it all completed by 2024 when our oldest bell has its 400th birthday. Some ringers we know think teaching teenagers is a waste of time - they frequently move on to other things. Indeed the 3 teenagers we had 3 years ago are now pinned to the demands of A levels and Uni entrance. Still they have been replaced by two more delightful young ladies. We always ask a parent to come with young trainees, and when one Mum said she had been taught to ring but never rang for a service, she was asked if she would like to try again. The result - almost as if she had never been away. Commenting on how well she had done brought forth the reply "Well you taught me - 30 years ago!" Now she is going to ring for a congregation, one that will include the Bishop of Exeter and two calves. One slightly older ringer meanwhile is wondering what's happened to his memory! Why the Bishop and two calves? Because (one year late) we are celebrating the 100th Anniversary of Young Farmers Clubs. This international organisation started life as the Hemyock Calf Club and first met in the Old Market opposite the Hemyock Church gate. And our Guild Patron, Bishop Robert, speaks on agricultural matters in the House of Lords.

Sunday: We ring some Sundays for the 6.30pm service and occasionally for a morning service. Bells are rung for practice most Mondays at 7.00pm.
Due to Covid restrictions fund raising has been limited, but thanks to Brenda and Mary’s Crafty Fundraising Group which operates on Oakford Massive (Facebook), over $£ 3000$. has been raised. This is a small group on Facebook who to date have 205 members who produce items to sell. The group has customers not only in Oakford parish but county wide, country wide and even as far away as Australia.

Our total funds raised to date amount to $£ 26,000$. We will be applying for grants soon. For more information on how to donate or to help in any way please contact the PCC secretary.

SILVERTON - St Mary's, 8 bells, tenor 16 cwt, grid ref. SS956028 Postcode EX5 4HS. Sunday: 9.00 for 9.30am (4th Sunday 9.30 for 10.00) Practice: Thursdays 7.45 pm .
Ringing at Silverton resumed in May when covid restrictions were relaxed. Prior to May, ringing was limited to one person chiming bells before the Sunday zoom service! Since May, ringing for Sunday church services and weddings has been by roster following CCCBR coronavirus guidelines and to avoid too many persons being in the ringing chamber.

At a pre-resumption meeting of our ringers in May we were pleased to welcome our new (2019) Rector Paul and his wife Wendy who are both ringers and who are now regular members of the band. Losses and new learners - that just about sums up the past two years of ringing and non-ringing. As mentioned in last year's report, Lynda retired from ringing and Tim moved away. The two other learners decided not to re-start ringing after lockdown. Early in 2022 Hazel expects to move out of the area, leaving just two of us. However, we have been actively recruiting, and now have two others who ring on Sundays, and two more learning. Let's hope for more. ## South West Branch

## Deaneries of Plymouth Devonport, Plymouth Moorside, Plymouth Sutton, Tavistock and Woodleigh

Due to the ongoing Covid restrictions, the Branch AGM was held on 22nd January as a virtual meeting on Zoom. The day began with open ringing in Ringing Room in the morning, led by the Ringing Master. Fifteen members took part, with the ringing split between two Ringing Rooms, according to ability. The AGM started at 2.30pm and was attended by 39 Branch members and 4 guests.

Due to restrictions all ringing from January until May was confined to on-line Ringing Room. Several towers held practice evenings on-line during each week, and the Branch Practices in the early months of the year were also held on Ringing Room. The Branch Practices in March and April offered open ringing for all members and an Introduction to the Blue Pathway. The April, May and June Branch Practices were originally for learning Cambridge Minor and an introduction to the Red Pathway. However, due to the Covid restrictions and the lack of ringing opportunity in towers, it was decided that these practices would continue to focus on the Blue Pathway methods. All the Branch practices were well attended, with two Ringing Rooms being used at most practices to allow for plenty of ringing by the ringers. Although it did not totally replace the face-to face ringing in Towers, the sessions gave everyone the opportunity to learn more and extend their method ringing knowledge and understanding. In all, Ringing Room practices also provided a source of mirth and merriment to others when individual ringers lost their internet connection! Many thanks to those that attended the practices, especially those who organised and ran the sessions. Unfortunately, the Branch Spring Outing had to be cancelled due to the restrictions but was replaced by an afternoon Ringing Room session, followed by an evening on-line quiz, which was very well attended. An enjoyable and competitive evening was had by all!

On 17th May, restrictions were lifted to allow a maximum of six ringers in a Tower, and so the return to 'normal' ringing was starting, hopefully. It was decided, at Branch level, to organise the ringing so that ringers would attend only one practice evening per week, thus allowing everyone who wanted to ring to do so. With the lifting of the 'maximum of 6 ' rule in July, 'normal' ringing was beginning to return. There was an understandable reluctance and concern to returning to ringing by some ringers, and as such, this resulted in the cancellation of the Joint Branch practice with mid Devon in August. The Autumn outing in September was the first chance for people from different towers to ring together for a long while. It was a most welcome opportunity to meet people in person, from a wide range of towers, rather than on Zoom and in Ringing Room!
