## General Secretary's Report

2022 was a year of transitions as the last pandemic restrictions were lifted and we were gradually able to meet again to ring. In June we were able to meet at Crediton for our first in-person Annual General Meeting since 2019. It was good to see many of you during the day and to welcome some new Guild officers, elected at the meeting.

It was particularly pleasing to see the Devon Young Ringers' team taking part in the Ringing World National Youth Contest in Exeter at the start of July; this was the culmination of several month's hard work by our Guild Youth Co-ordinator and the team of helpers.

In October we were delighted to be the guests of the Mid Devon branch for the Guild striking contest, held at Bishopsteignton and Dawlish. Three contests were held and the David Willis plate, the new trophy for the novice 8 -bell striking contest was awarded to the Aylesbeare branch.

I've also been pleased to be able to join some of you at your branch meetings during the autumn and I look forward to seeing many of you during 2023.

## Bells and Belfries Advisors

Following the lifting of Covid restrictions, 2022 proved to be a busy year with a good number ofinspections being carried out, and also the completion of several restoration schemes by the professional bell hangers.

Major inspections were carried out at Romansleigh (January), Holcombe Burnell and Walkhampton (March), Broadhembury (April), Peter Tavy and Newton St Cyres (August), Stoke Gabriel (September) and Rackenford (November). Return visits were made to both Broadhembury and Peter Tavy to correct the sets of their bells, several of which were setting far too deeply. Follow-up inspections, which concentrate on the progress of work recommended in a previous report, were carried out at Cadeleigh and Clayhidon (May) and East Portlemouth (October).

At Romansleigh we found the foundation beams to be in poor condition and the west side of the bell-frame to be somewhat unstable. At Holcombe Burnell the steel sub-frame is heavily corroded and is in urgent need of rubbing down and painting. At Walkhampton the main issue is of water entering the tower through the very porous stonework of the south face. The intermediate floor is now extremely decayed and rotten; so much so that the church authorities have sadly declared that the bells should not be rung until the floor is replaced.

Our visits to Broadhembury and Rackenford mainly highlighted just maintenance issues, while at Peter Tavy we found everything very loose and spent much of our visit tightening up the bell-frame and headstock nuts. At Newton St Cyres the main issue is that the sound tube system bringing sound down from the bells in the upper tier has collapsed and requires rebuilding. At Stoke Gabriel the treble clapper needs either re-profiling or replacing as it is causing a severe indentation in the soundbow of the bell. Also, the head of the rider frame for the second bell is extremely close to the tower wall such that it bounces on it when the bell is rung.

Despite the valiant efforts of the tower captain, we have to say that Cadeleigh bells are now well overdue for a rehang. At Clayhidon the main issue is lack of ringers, and we spent some time advising the churchwarden on the reinstatement and method of use of the Ellacombe chiming system. We are pleased to report that East Portlemouth bells remain in excellent order.

During the year we also visited Plympton St Mary to advise on minor cracks appearing in two of the bell pads, and Roborough, to investigate the poor going of the second and third bells. Here we found the south side of the bell-frame to be quite unstable such that the outer frame head is moving significantly in relation to the inner head. We strongly recommended contacting the professional bell-hangers with a view to remedying this.

A more unusual inspection involved a visit to Sampford Peverell Primary School to check the condition of the school bell with a view to bringing it back into use, as reported in 'Ringing Round Devon'. We also responded to enquiries from Upton Pyne, Westleigh, Thurlestone and Feniton, the latter requesting a follow-up inspection which we hope to attend to in the new year. We can report that restoration work by the professional bell-hangers has been completed during the year at Milton Abbot, where the six bells have been rehung with all new fittings in a new steel frame; at

Cadbury, where the bells have been rehung in the existing frame; at East Anstey, where the bells have been rehung in the repaired existing frame; at Butterleigh, where the three bells have been rehung as a fixed electronically-operated chime; at Denbury, where the ring of five bells has been transformed into a very pleasant six by adding a new treble and replacing the former very poor second and tenor bells which have been retained for display in the church; and at Cotleigh, where major maintenance has been carried out including repairs to the frame. In each case your advisors assisted the Diocesan Consultant on Bells with the inspection and final signing off of the work.

Work is currently under way at Bigbury, where the bells are being rehung on new sub-frames; at Stoodleigh, where the cracked treble bell is to be welded; and at Huntshaw, where the three bells are being rehung for swing-chiming with a view to possibly augmenting and hanging for full-circle ringing in the future. In association with this latter scheme lan Campbell gave a well-attended and very well received talk, as was reported in 'Ringing Round Devon'.

We were pleased to be joined for our inspectio one of our team at Newton St Cyres and Stoke Gabriel by, and look forward to being accompanied by her in the future - a future Guild Bell Advisor perhaps!

As always, when carrying out inspections, maintenance is carried out at the same time, taking the view that, rather than just reporting that a nut is loose, it makes sense to put a spanner on it and tighten it if at all possible. No charge is made for tower visits or reports but most have made voluntary donations which are put into the DCBRF. As always may we emphasize that we are always happy to visit any Guild (or indeed any other) tower to report on the condition of the bell installation, and to offer advice on any maintenance or restoration issues.

## Central Council Representatives Report

We recently received a debrief from our Central Council representatives following their attendance at the 2022 CCCBR meeting in Nottingham. A recording is available for those who weren't able to attend. https://youtu.be/l3joCmilVIs.

The Central Council meeting in 2024 will be held in Devon and as you will hear (about 20 minutes into the recording) we have an opportunity to influence some of the additional activities which will

take place over the course of the weekend. The Guild officers would be very interested to hear any opinions or requests you may wish to put forward to the Central Council organising team in readiness for the 2024 visit.

## Devon Church Bell Restoration Fund (Charity Number 276490)

During 2022 we have seen several projects finally conclude after the shut down and restrictions of Covid meaning the Fund has paid out some $£ 33,500$ in total.

Inspections continue to be a large part of our work. Quinquennial bell inspections have been completed at Cadeleigh, Clayhidon, Stoke Gabriel, Holcombe Burnell and East Portlemouth. Other inspections have taken place at nineteen towers in the County and on top of this, completed restoration work has been checked and signed off at Butterleigh, East Anstey, Milton Abbot, Cadbury, Denbury and Cotleigh. This means that during the year the Trustees have inspected the bells at thirty towers, so between two and three per month. All of this is done in our own time and at no cost to the Bell Fund, Guild or Association.

We held our usual two meetings during the year, in April and November. The changes in Chairman, and Secretary have been completed and both are busy fulfilling their various duties.

The bulk of our financial assets remain in the form of the investment portfolio purchased from the William Smale Bequest, and continue to be managed through the Discretionary Portfolio Service of Cathedral Financial Management Ltd of Exeter. The value as at 4 January 2023 was $£ 327,410$, as you can see from the accounts this value is ever changing and is unlikely to stabilise for some time to come. As anticipated the dividends received from the investment portfolio this year are lower than pre Covid at $£ 11,365$ but heading in the right direction.

Income during the year (excluding that from the investment portfolio) has so far amounted to $£ 7,543$, including $£ 863$ received from Association towers and events. $£ 3,774$ from the Guild and its Branches, $£ 1,302$ from personal and miscellaneous donations and $£ 320$ following tower inspections. Personal donations made through the CAF donation facility on both the Guild and Association web pages has amounted to $£ 401$, and donations via AmazonSmile raised a further £113. Tax refunds following gift-aided donations and bank interest make up the balance.

At the beginning of 2022 the liquid assets of the Fund stood at $£ 66,929$. Since that time six grants totalling $£ 33,500$ have been paid. $£ 6,000$ to Cadbury where the bells were rehung in the existing frame with all new fittings plus tuning of all but the mediaeval fourth and tenor bells. $£ 9,000$ to Milton Abbot where the bells were rehung in a new frame with mainly new fittings, the bells were turned and tuned. A new belfry floor was built and a new rope guide was added. $£ 5,700$ to East Anstey where a total rehang of the six bells with mainly new fittings has been completed. $£ 2,400$ to Butterleigh where the three bells have been conserved and restored to allow for automated chiming, also trapdoors were cut in the floors to allow the bells to be removed and returned. $£ 9,200$ to Denbury for a complete rehang in a refurbished frame, the ring was augmented to a six. Two of the old bells were "retired" so the tower has three new bells. A new ringing chamber has been created upstairs making the whole ringing experience so much more enjoyable. $£ 1,200$ to Cotleigh where a general renovation has taken place, including replacing part of the frame then rubbing down and repainting the rest of the existing frame.

Grants agreed this year include $£ 3,700$ for Huntshaw where all three bells are to be rehung on new headstocks with all new fittings. The 2 nd needs to be welded. The treble is to be hung to allow swing chiming by rope, and all bells to be hung for chiming with electromagnetic hammers. The creation of trapdoors which will allow access to the bells for removal and repairs to the intermediate chamber including the insertion of two steel beams. $£ 1,200$ to Cotleigh (already paid, see above), $£ 300$ to Tiverton St Paul who wish to replace all 6 clappers to improve the sound and go of the bells, $£ 900$ to Stoodleigh to have the cracked treble bell removed, welded and rehung, $£ 380$ to Sampford Peverell where new gudgeons are required in the tenor headstock and $£ 950$ to Uplyme where the frame needs scraping down and repainting plus a general overall of the bells and fittings. Assuming the outstanding eight grants agreed to date are taken up, the uncommitted liquid balance of the Fund stands at approximately $£ 29,758$.

## Denmisch Simulator Report

Following COVID the after-school club has not yet restarted, despite a few suggestions to the school. The simulators were booked for the Ringing World National Youth Competition at the start of July. When checking them out a month or so beforehand it was found that both of the computers which had been left there to control the bells were inoperable, and that most of the wooden pulleys below the bells had seized up or were very reluctant to turn, presumably because of the uptake of moisture into the woodwork. One of the sensors on the bells had also failed. It was replaced by a spare. The main faulty computer was repaired and a spare computer programmed and installed. In addition my laptop was configured so that it could be used if necessary. Each of the simulators was unscrewed from the floor and screws holding the frame together were released so that the pulley could be removed together with its supporting blocks. The blocks were then planed down a little to prevent them from rubbing against the pulley when reinstalled.

The security of the gate at the top of the stairs, which gives access to the ringing chamber, has been tightened up by the school. Special arrangements have to be made in advance of every ringing session. The request was actually overlooked by the school on the day of the youth competition and access was only possible just before the event started when a member of staff was called out to unlock the gate. In the event it was disappointing that only a few teams made the walk across from the cathedral to try out the bells but all seemed to enjoy them - as always ringing with the 'sheep' sound was most popular although several budding heavy-bell ringers enjoyed ringing with the bell sounding like Grandisson (the cathedral tenor)!

The simulators are available for any bands that would like to try them out or ring quarter or full peals at any time when the school is not in session including evenings and weekends.

## Devon Ringer's Council Report

The ringing festival arranged by the DRC on the 4 Saturday in April was reinstated after a gap of two years due to the Covid Pandemic. There were insufficient entries to run the 10 -bell scheduled to take place at Axminster. However, many ringers were present including members from the host tower. Call changes were rung on 6,8 , and 10 bells throughout an enjoyable morning. Several people ringing at Axminster for the first time and others their first on the 10. The 8-bell took place at Honiton and the 6-bell at Clyst St. George. Thanks to all clergy and tower captains for allowing the DRC the use of their bells and thanks to all entrants who helped raise $£ 200$ for the DCBRF.

The Carol Service took place during the pandemic via the Zoom facility and thanks must go to all who made this possible. It went 'live' once again and for the first time in its 30 -year history was held at the Parish Church of St. Michael, Kingsteignton on Saturday 17th December. Thanks to the retiring collection on the day, a cheque for $£ 100$ was sent to the Children's Hospice South- West.

The DRC was formed in 2001 and consisted of members from both the Guild and Association. Circumstances have evolved and progressed over the past 20 years, and it is felt that the original reason for the forming of the DRC has been addressed to a large degree - that of bringing the two ringing fraternities close together. It will be proposed that its future membership be re-designed. To this end, meetings will be held and hopefully bring us even closer together. Who knows, we might even have one ringing association one day? In so doing the plan for future membership of the Council could change to invite specific people who have a specific interest and expertise in a specific agenda item. An excellent agenda item example of how things will now move forward will be the forthcoming 150-and 100-year celebrations due to take place in 2024 and 2025. Another will be 'Ring for the King.' Although work is already underway with this, there may be ways in which the DRC can be helpful to all towers in the County whether Guild or Association affiliated. Watch this space.

## Devon Young Ringers Report

Devon Young Ringers has continued to meet monthly at St Michael and All Angels, Pinhoe throughout 2022 with generous support from volunteers. The tower is ideal for the group as an easy, ground floor ring of eight in a central Devon location, with ample parking. Attendance of young ringers to these practices has been low and efforts are continuing to reach more young people in Devon from both the Guild and Association.

Several Devon Young Ringers joined a mini outing organised to Dunkerswell and Churchstanton (Somerset) which was a brilliant day out and a great chance for our ringers to get to know one another. 2022 saw the Ringing World National Youth Contest hosted in Exeter. Devon Young Ringers entered a band of six into the call change competition and were delighted to come 4th place out sixteen bands, with a special mention from the judges for ringing Devon-style changes with closed handstroke leads. On the competition day, the ringers enjoyed a fantastic and inspiring day out in Exeter, with a chance to ring at several towers and mini-rings.

In 2023 the RWNYC will be held in York on 8th July 2023. York will be a significant challenge compared to Exeter however we are aiming to raise a band to compete and plans are underway to achieve this. This will be an exciting and inspiring weekend for our ringers and will be a highlight of the year. Monthly practices will continue at Pinhoe on the 2nd Sunday of the month from 2-4pm (except for April which has been moved to 16 th April so as not to clash with Easter Sunday). We will also hold a Young Ringers mini-outing on the week commencing 10th April, full details to be confirmed. All abilities are welcome at our practices and outings. We have young ringers who are just learning to handle a bell right up to those who have rung peals. The mixture of abilities gives our more able ringers the opportunity to practice their mentoring skills, and the atmosphere is extremely supportive. The sessions support young ringers in Devon to meet one another, make new friends and try new challenges together. I would be grateful to branches and towers for encouraging your young ringers to attend our practices as we attempt to build our numbers this year. The budget for Young Ringers events has been spent on tower donations to Pinhoe, refreshments for the practices and on costs associated with our entry to the RW National Youth Contest. Through 2023 our expenditure for practices will be similar, however expenses for travel and accommodation in York will be more significant.

## Education Officer report

Soon after taking up office, I sent out a survey to all the Branch Education officers. The replies received suggested that those particular branches were doing a good job of managing their learners and teaching; they are making good use of the ART materials, as well as using their competent ringers to help out at other towers from time to time when required. This seems to an effective way of meeting local needs, although not so easy with far flung towers, and we must be aware that this could result in the overworking of a valiant few. A guild event/day course might be helpful in such a case.

Some branches are able to offer a more centralised format, collecting together in one tower for a few weeks' practice of specific skills. There were a couple of requests for some Guild sessions for practicing Surprise major methods, as not many towers or groups of towers have their own SM bands. I've also had requests that we organise some practices of plain hunt on 'bigger' numbers, and arrange some 10-bell practices Guild-wide.

Most recently with the impetus of Ring for the King, branches have been very proactive about attracting more ringers, some brand new, others previously lapsed. Well done if this includes your branch. How are you managing these extra people? Are you holding separate sessions for beginners, getting together with another tower to hold special sessions, absorbing them into your normal practice night? Give me a call if you need some ideas.

There is a thought that we could join with the Association in their desire to ring every bell in the County to celebrate a special anniversary in 2024/5. Some ideas have been put forward about teaching centres/ ringing schools, and wondering about using St Petrock's Exeter as such?

Having come from Sussex to Devon, I'm wondering whether it would be possible to run a weekend of courses as they do very successfully, offering two-day intensive courses at a variety of levels, each level lasting the two days, from Plain Bob Doubles onwards.

I've been trying to get out and visit branch practices, in order to meet new faces, put names and faces together, and generally introduce myself. Thank you to those of you who have have made me so welcome. It's been fun and I look forward to meeting many more of you.

## Frank Mack Garage Ring

I am pleased to report that the FMGR have bounced back into use after a period of inactivity due to the pandemic. During the year the bells have been put to good use at events around the County including, Exeter Cathedral, Killerton, Branscombe, Kingskerswell and Membury. Whilst it looks unlikely we will be attending the Devon County Show in the near future, an event that was extremely successful was the Brixham Steam Fair. This was arranged by the Mid-Devon Branch where we had an excellent turn-out attracting many people over three days.

As many of you know, the bells being so light often prove to be problematical initially even for experienced ringers but apart from the fun side of this ring, it has in previous years proved to be of unmeasured success in getting potential learners into a tower near them. Long may this continue. The lightness of the bells and therefore quite an unrealistic comparison with tower bells, does not appear to put people off having a go. Indeed, there is a greater sense of achievement having conquered something so tricky. A visual plus for potentiallearners is being able to see both the bell and ringer simultaneously and therefore perhaps grasping a speedier understanding of what one is attempting to achieve.

## Guild Librarian

Library Opening and Usage. The Library's main book and pamphlet collection is housed at St Petrock's in Exeter. The Library was opened 10 times, approximately monthly, during the year. This has ensured that the small damp problem reported last year has been kept well under control and meant that members have a regular opportunity to visit. While the number of loans and visits is relatively small, email enquiries continue to come in at least monthly on average. In 2022 seven of these were from Guild members, two from the Central Council Library and two from other enquirers. The Friends of the Library enjoyed a subscription holiday in 2022 recognising the limits imposed on library use by the pandemic, but subscriptions for 2023 are now due and a new Friends Newsletter is in preparation.

New Acquisitions, Donations and Disposals. A major new ringing publishing initiative is being developed by The Ringing World. Copies of the Little Purple and Little Green Ringing Books and the Criblines series have been purchased for the "Learner's Library" collection and Simon Linford's The Core Seven and Beyond: A Guide to Treble Dodging Major has been added to the main collection. We were pleased to accept two significant donations to the Library. We omitted to report that in 2021 we were approached by the family of E.V. Cox and offered a postcard album. Inscribed "Views of towers in which I have rung. Ernest V. Cox", the album contains postcards and photographs of churches across the country, and some have messages and postmarks on their reverse. Prebendary E.V. Cox was the Guild's President from 1934 to 1961 and had previously been Guild Secretary, Chairman of Exeter Branch and the first Secretary and Treasurer of the newly formed North East Branch. Naturally, we were pleased to accept the offer and are grateful to the great nephew and niece of "E V", for the generous gift. We are also grateful to a former Guild member, who gave useful modern facsimile editions of classic ringing titles such as Tintinnalogia and Morris's History and Art of Change Ringing. Being able to lend the modern editions protects some of the originals we have in the Library.

In line with the decision of the Guild we have disposed of some of the duplicate copies of titles
where there is no special reason to keep them. Book sales were held at the Guild AGM in Crediton and at the Guild Striking Competitions in Dawlish. A total of $£ 165$ was raised for library funds.

Digitising our records. A further batch of older Guild Annual Reports were scanned and digitised during the year. Reports from 1910 to 1961 are now available through a link on the library pages of the Guild website and are a valuable first starting point for many enquiries. We are grateful to a Guild member for the considerable work involved in making the scanning possible and preparing the resulting files in an OCR format which allows textword searching of each report.

## RINGING WORLD 2024 CALENDAR PROJECT

The Project Team consists of the RW Editor, along with five other Guild and Association representatives. We were sad to lose one of the team in the summer, but pleased to welcome a member from Kings Nympton with wide TV \& film experience, to replace him.
Progress so far. Discussions have taken place with about the format and technical issues related to the publication of the calendar. A long list of about 30 possible locations to include have been identified and the six most iconic and those most relevant to Guild or Association history have been selected. The team is currently capturing photographs and collecting information for captions and brief histories of both societies. This work needs to be completed by April this year for the publication to go to press in June.
Costs and Sales. Travel expenses are likely to be the largest cost for the project and a budget has been agreed with the Guild Treasurer. We have been offered copies of the finished publication at $£ 2$ each for sale in Devon. This is a substantial reduction on the expected full price of $£ 10$. If we succeed in selling 100 copies between the two societies (at a reduced price for advance and by collection sales) and locally in Devon, we will generate a small profit for the DCBRF. Copies are expected to go on sale in August.

## Guild Insurance Officer

The Guild insurance is provided by Ecclesiastical who also cover the majority of churches in the UK. Consequently, as an insurer, they have a good understanding of the risks associated with churches including bells. Ecclesiastical have an excellent reputation and the cover adequately meets the Guild's insurance requirements.

We currently have the following covers:

- Public Liability - to cover bodily injury or damage to third parties at Guild events
- Employers' Liability - to cover injury to people acting under instruction (the definition of Employee includes volunteers)
- Trustee' and Management liability - to protect trustees and the management committee against liability for wrongful (inadvertent) acts/omissions


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I think these are the core cover requirements for the Guild and although we could look at other cover aspects such as cyber liability cover for breaches of data and material cover for theft of Guild assets etc, I think the risk is minimal and my recommendation is the cover remains as it is.

The primary purpose of the insurance is to cover Public and Employers' Liability at Guild Events Only. Insurance is a requirement to hold Guild events and the membership fees go towards allowing these events to happen not as a private insurance arrangement for members.

Although we have previously discussed the fact it can extend to protect members if they were involved in an incident which is not specifically a Guild event but could be considered a general Guild activity (i.e. pretty much most ringing by Guild members), this is not what the cover is in place for and should only be used as a "emergency" last resort if there is no other cover in place. Apologies if I did not explain this clearly previously.

In practice, most incidents will be covered by the insurance of the Church in which they occur unless there is a specific Guild event being held there in which case it depends on the circumstances i.e. was it the Guild's fault (perhaps a someone tripped over a Guild sign) or Church's fault (perhaps poor maintenance etc) that led to an incident occurring. It is highly unlikely that a Church would make a liability claim against an individual member for damage to the property etc such as breaking a rope. Further, most people's domestic home policies will have personal liability cover, so if an individual causes an incident themselves whilst on a ringing trip for instance (which isn't specifically a Guild event), a claim may be more applicable with them directly rather then to the Guild or host church. The amount of claims scenarios for individual members are endless and it is very difficult to say whether the Guild would be liable or whether cover would operate in each instance. It is much better to keep things simple and note that the cover is primarily in force for Guild events.

As insurance officer, I am very happy to answer queries regarding claims, events being organised and further, advise the Guild on the most suitable cover for its needs.

The one potential claim was for an incident which occurred at St Andrews, Plymouth and is a good example of what I am trying to convey above. From memory, I think a slider failed and a ringer was taken up quite some distance and suffered an arm injury. Now although this occurred at a Guild tower, it was not specifically a Guild event. This was a local practice and the ringers are practising to maintain standards for Sunday ringing at that church. As the incident was as a result of a failure of church property, the logical claim would be made against the church insurance policy (also most likely with Ecclesiastical). If the tutor was blamed for the incident, again in the first instance, the claim would go through the church insurance as they are a (voluntary) employee of the church. However, if for whatever reason the church policy would not operate (I cannot see any reason why it wouldn't), the Guild cover would almost certainly protect that member for bodily injury caused whilst an individual was injured under their instruction (under the recently added Employers' Liability section). It is also worth noting that at a local practice, there may be a mix of Guild and non Guild members so again, in the first instance the church insurance should be relied upon. The key point is that members should really be relying on the Church insurance for most things in the first instance unless specifically at a Guild/branch event.

I hope this summarises the key aspects of the cover in force. Should you have ay further queries on the above, please do not hesitate to contact me.

## Ringing Recruitment \& Retention

## Workgroup

Following the workgroup report submitted to the Guild AGM on 18th June 2022, the workgroup has held three further meetings, the most recent on the 4th January 2023. The workgroup continues to receive feedback from the branches represented regarding recruitment activities held during the second half of 2022. In general, the most successful approach to recruitment seems to be the holding of taster sessions, which are advertised locally via various social media channels.

## Guild Recruitment Resources

1. Learn to Ring to Crown a King The ringing of the bells across the UK to mark the death of Queen

Elizabeth has helped to bring ringing back into the spotlight. The forthcoming coronation of King Charles has been taken as a recruitment opportunity by the Central Council. In line with this, the workgroup has developed a specific recruitment leaflet called, "Learn to Ring to Crown a King" which encourages people to sign up to learn the basics of bell ringing in time to ring for the King's coronation. The workgroup designed the leaflet, using the logo provided by the Central Council and contains space to insert details of local taster sessions or practice nights. It also has a QR code which links to a Guild contact form where they can leave their details and be directed to their nearest teaching tower. This resource was sent as a PDF to all BranchSecretaries in mid-November and is also available on the Guild website to download and print locally. Several towers are using the recruitment leaflet and they have received a number of enquiries to attend the taster sessions.
2. General recruitment resources The workgroup has revised and modernised the Devon Ringing tri-fold leaflet and created an accompanying A3 or A4 poster for display. The tri-fold leaflet contains information about the basics of ringing and what learning to ring entails, plus information on both traditions and signposts to the Guild and the Association for more information. There is space for local contact details and taster sessions to be added. It also contains the Guild QR code which links to the Guild contact form where people can register their interest in learning to ring. There is also signposting to ART and CCCBR. This leaflet is intended to be given out at events and can be used alongside the CCCBR leaflet.

The A4/A3 poster (2 pages) has virtually the same content as the trifold but it has been designed to be displayed in towers, in church porches, information boards etc. There is a small space for local contact details and the Guild QR code for the Guild contact. This resource will be available to download from the Guild website and can be printed locally.

The contact information on the poster can be changed by request to the Publicity Officer and can be updated at any time. A simple A5 recruitment flyer which outlines the basics of learning to ring, along with the QR code which links to the Guild contact form and the Guild Education Officer's email has also been created. Information about local taster sessions can be added to the reverse side. This resource will be available to download from the Guild website and can be printed locally. The contact information on the poster can be changed by request to the Publicity Officer and can be updated at any time.

The draft versions of these leaflets have been shared with the Association to see if they would be interested in using these resources and what information they would like to be included. The Association has confirmed they are happy with the proposed text and if they want to use the leaflets they will be able to buy some from the Guild. Quotes have been received from Pollards, who print our Guild Report for review by Guild Officers. The workgroup also created a GDPR compliant individual sign-up sheet. This is for people to express an interest in learning to ring and to provide their contact details. This is available on the website.

## Guild Drop in Taster Sessions and Ringing Courses

The workgroup will begin to look into the feasibility of holding some Saturday drop in taster session at St Petrock's in Exeter. This has been chosen because of its location, the ease of access to the church, the encouraging and supportive relationship with the church itself and the fact that the church holds the Guild's Library. In the first instance the idea is to hold some scheduled taster sessions on the 3rd Saturday of the month, which is the day the Guild Library is open in the afternoon. The Cathedral ringers typically practice on this 3rd Saturday evening and some of those ringers may be willing to help out. Ringers from the Exeter Colleges Guild may also be willing to help. The workgroup will also look into the possibility of organising day courses, or holding a ringing weekend/residential course to cater for different levels of ringing. One idea is to hold this during the October Ringing Festival

## The Big Ding

As 2024 and 2025 are significant years in the history of the Guild and the Association, the workgroup is considering having a joint bash, with the Association and Guild joining together to make a big noise. The workgroup will look into the feasibility of organising an open tower day and inviting 20 or 30 towers that are rarely rung to open their doors and to advertise the opportunity

for tower grabbing. It could also be used to fundraise for the DCBRF and also to encourage method and call change ringers to ring together.

## A Guild Vision and Strategy

Recruitment and retention and the need for more trainers are the key issues facing ringing in Devon. This is true for Guild and Association towers and at present we do not have a clear picture of the health (or otherwise) of ringing in Guild Towers. The Central Council have identified the next seven years as a critical time for ringing, in that if we don't make a concerted and sustained effort to recruit and retain learners and train teachers, by the time we get to 2030, in many places we will have lost the critical mass needed to keep ringing going.

Given the demographic of the majority of ringers in Devon (outside the urban centres of Plymouth and Exeter), we would concur that the next 7-10 years are critical to future of ringing across our county. In light of this the workgroup will start to work in collaboration with the Guild's branches and towers to begin to gather data to create a "heat map", that is an activity map showing the numbers of active ringers in towers, towers with learners and teaching activities, towers which provide training for improvers and so on, so we can see where there are hubs and hotspots of activity. From this we can start to make some recommendations for the future structure of the Guild and its branches. The basic vision of the workgroup therefore, is that the Guild and its branches are structured to work in such a way as to help facilitate the recruitment and distribution of ringers to where they are needed for service ringing.

## On-going Recommendations from Work Group Discussions

1. The Guild, having now recruited a Publicity officer, will start to look at developing a comprehensive communications strategy to complement local level advertising. The Publicity Officer will do this in conjunction with the workgroup and branch publicity officers and start to compile a list of publications which the Guild might pay to advertise in. This also includes making better use of Ringing Round Devon and any other ringing focused publications/medial channels.
2. With new recruitment resources available, the Guild will now look to develop a recruitment page on the website aimed a learners and those with no knowledge of bell ringing.

## Next Meeting

The date of the next workgroup meeting will be the 8th March at 7.30 pm on Zoom. The workgroup currently lacks representatives from the Exeter and North/ North-West branches. If a ringer from these branches would care to join us it would improve communication and make the workgroup more representative. Anyone interested should contact the Guild Secretary.

## Ringing Round Devon Newsletter

Four issues of Ringing Round Devon were produced in 2022. The decision was taken to restart the provision of printed copies (which had been suspended during COVID) in addition to the provision of the downloadable web version. The March and June issues were each 16 pages, with covers and centre pages in colour, and the others only black and white. For the September version I was provided with a large number of illustrated articles covering the summer activities, including the Ringing World Youth Competition and the Queen's Platinum Jubilee so it was decided (in conjunction with the Guild officers) to print this with colour photographs throughout (24 pages), despite the slightly larger cost. This continued with the December issue (20 pages). All personal subscriptions for printed copies have been extended to cover those issues which were only made available on-line. The number of personal subscribers has reduced since COVID, with the death of more than one and several who are happy to read the on-line version. This does not affect the viability of the printing as, with modern printing techniques, there are no setup costs and we only pay for the number of copies printed. Postage costs however, are increasing so an effort is made to distribute as many copies as possible through the Branch Officers, who also distribute copies to
their towers. Thanks are due to them for this service. I am very grateful to all those who continue to send in articles and pictures.

## Report Secretary

The production of the 2021 Report went very smoothly, no bumps on the way and without any major re-editing. There was a turn-down in the number of advertisers, probably due to the cost of living affecting almost everything. Whilst this may have reduced the income from this source, it was offset by the reduction in number of pages, less peals and quarters being rung, leading to a lower printing cost.

The move to publishing a redacted version has now become a fixture for the future, as has the reduced number of printed copies required. This has all helped towards keeping the print bill down, streamlined the distribution of reports, and keeping the postage lower. The 2022 report will most likely be a larger issue as the number of quarters and peals have risen from 2021 and will play a key factor in how it is printed. Once I have a good idea of the size of the 2022 Report I will obtain print prices and let our Treasurer know the relevant costing.

The total number of hits on the website has increased from 23,736 in 2001 to 32,767 in 2022 with the usual pages appearing in the top 10 most viewed list. ## Treasurer's Report

## Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The General Fund shows a surplus of $£ 2,440.87$ (2020: $£ 1,980.47$ ).
Subscriptions and Tower Affiliation fees increased from $£ 6$ to $£ 10$. These accounts show $70 \%$ of subscription income as your branch retains $30 \%$ of your subscription. The accounts also include a few late payments from last year. The number of affiliated towers has reduced by one to 99 and our membership has reduced by 58 to 531 paying members.

You will see donation income of $£ 200$ and a matching cost for the David Willis Trophy for the Novice 8 Bell Striking Competition which was generously donated by one of our members.

Peal ringing fees have increased as more peals have been rung. Our towers have received quarterly printed copies of Ringing Round Devon, with the last two splendid publications of 2022 printed in full colour. Our four Central Council representatives attended the Nottingham meeting, and their expenses came in below budget. Printing costs for the Annual Report are as expected. The 2019 \& 2020 reports were printed in one document so therefore the printing cost attributed to 2021 are exceptionally low.

The Bell Restoration Fund shows a total of $£ 4,109.18$ (2020: $£ 3,827.58$ ) was raised for the DCBRF. This includes the transfer from the General Fund of $£ 2,035$ agreed at the June 2022 AGM. Members have again donated generously to the Guild Bell Restoration Fund through the subscription process. Other fund raising and donations is disappointingly low.

We agreed financial support to Young Ringers Activities for the twelve months through to June 2023. They held regular practices and entered a team in the Ringing World National Youth Contest (RWNYC) which was held in Exeter in July 2023. The team came fourth out of 16 teams in the call change category. Congratulations to the team and the adult helpers.

There have been small movements on the Instruction and Education Fund and the Denmisch Fund. The Library Fund, which has increased due to the sales of surplus stocks, is making a transfer of $£ 180$ to the General Fund to help cover the costs of the library.

Assets held by the Guild at 31 December 2022 were $£ 9,503.74$ (2021: $£ 9,261.37$ ) with the General Fund balance standing at $£ 8,250.95$ (2021: $£ 8,249.12$ ).

Thank you to all Guild members for your help and support in achieving these results which mean we have a healthy level of reserves to invest in ringing and regrow our membership.

## Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees of the Guild of Devonshire Ringers (Registered Charity No. 1002950) <br> Accounts for the Year Ended 31st December 2022

I report on the accounts of the Guild for the year ended 31 December 2022, which are set out in this report.

## Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed,
It is my responsibility to:
(a) examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;
(b) to follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
(c) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

## Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the general Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. We have continued to ring for the first Sunday of the month. We are regularly joined by a very experienced cathedral ringer, who now lives in Honiton. We have welcomed two ladies who are making good progress as learners and will be ringing with us to celebrate the coronation. We had one visiting band who rang a quarter peal,and rang for two weddings, two funerals, the platinum, jubilee, to mark the death of the late Queen on the 13th and 19th of September, and to mark the induction of our new incumbent. Offwell primary school has started a bell ringing club as a lunchtime activity and the children are enthusiastic and increasing in competence.

Following the disruption of the past couple of years, the ringing at the Cathedral has returned to a relatively normal level. On 14th May, we were involved with an 'Open Cathedral' event and had an area demonstrating ringing which included the Frank Mack mini ring, dumb bell and handbells. This provided much interest with most people handling a bell for the first time - including many youngsters who didn't want to leave. On 2nd July, we hosted the Ringing World National Youth Contest, which attracted hundreds of young ringers from all over the country. This involved the Cathedral being the main 'hub' for the day, with workshops, demonstrations, refreshments and even its own Pizza van. All teams rang on the Cathedral bells with competitions being held at St Mark's and St David's, with other towers being open for general ringing across the city all day.

Quarter peals were rung on the front eight or ten for Eucharist on the first Sunday of the month and on the full twelve for the fourth Sunday evensong, so together with the Devon Association (ringing on the second and fifth Sundays) we continue to ring at the Cathedral on each Sunday in some form. On the method front the repertoire was extended at the beginning of the year to include Zanussi, both on its own and in spliced, with the other methods rung regularly being Erin, Stedman, Cambridge, Yorkshire, Bristol and Littleport.

A total of twenty-nine quarter peals were rung on the bells during the year. In February the Cathedral Society rang a peal of 5070 Spliced Royal on the Jubilee Ten to mark the Platinum Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II and in September a fully muffled peal of Grandsire Caters on the minor ten to mark her passing.

Operation London Bridge came in to force following the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II in September and kept us busy. At noon on the day following the announcement the 11th was tolled ninety-six times and fully muffled ringing (with the tenor open at backstroke) took place on the full
twelve and the minor ten (11th as tenor) for memorial services. In between all this the muffles were removed, and all 12 were rung 'open' for the proclamation of the new King outside the west front, before the muffles were replaced again.

In the National 12 Bell Striking Competition we came in third eliminator at Chester, ringing Stedman Cinques, having required some last minute changes to the team membership due to Covid. We had similar issues in the run up to the final at Guildford and were placed eight. The South-West 12 Bell Contest resumed in 2022, this year held at Taunton, where we finished in third place. The GDR 6-bell competition was held at Bishopsteignton where we rang London S Minor and were placed joint first.

During the display of 'The Moon' in the nave we took the opportunity to do some public handbell ringing. A peal of Kent TB Major was rung whilst other Society members spoke to the public to explain about ringing and hand out some information. And in October, 30 Society members and friends enjoyed a weekend in York sampling the many rings of bells available in the city and local area and enjoying time to socialise together - this included a peal, four quarters and ringing for Evensong at York Minster.

As the Cathedral returns to normal, we have been asked to start our talks again at the end of a roof tour which will now include the belfry and the bells - now that we have the protective cage around the bells to allow this access.

## With towers from the Deaneries of Newton Abbot, Torbay, Totnes and Kenn

2022 was another busy year for the branch, with the usual program of practices, training and outings. Our numbers this year have recovered well following the pandemic and most events were well attended, especially the two outings. The first of these was a tour including the local minirings, starting at Bowerdon and ending at Kings-Ting-Tong (via Rattery, where we rang at these rarely visited five) and the second tour to towers in Exeter. This was to have been by train, but the announcement that there was to be a rail strike on 1st October led to it being rapidly re-arranged by car instead. Nonetheless, a good day was had by all, with visits to St Thomas, St David, St Mark and Topsham, ending with a meal in The Lighter Inn in Topsham.

A major highlight of the year was the branch stand at the Torbay Steam Fair. This was the first time we had attended and the purpose of the venture was to highlight the joys of bell ringing to the public, in a similar way to the Devon County Show has done in the past. The Guild mini-ring formed the showpiece attraction, along with displays and working models. We enjoyed a steady flow of folk wishing to have a go and over the three days around 150 people had a ring, with varying degrees of success. The thing that struck us most was how many conversations we had with people who said either their father or grand-father or uncle or somebody in their family used to ring! Several conversations led to us suggesting if they wished to learn they could simply present themselves at their local tower. Whether they ever did or not we will probably never know, but from little seeds....

Bovey Tracey hosted the AGM in November, the first time we have been there for a meeting since they joined the Guild in 2019. The service was well attended and besides a thought provoking sermon based on the Ringer's Hymn, we were treated to three leads of Bristol rung on handbells, another first for the branch. Following a fantastic ringer's tea provided by the Bovey ringers, the business meeting progressed smoothly and efficiently, with a few changes to the committee.

This year it feels like we have finally put Covid behind us, rung as normal, and with a thriving band too. We have about 18 regulars, so there's usually a dozen or so at practice, and enough on Sundays. Our regular repertoire includes call changes, Kaleidoscope, Bastow, Plain Hunt, Plain Bob, Grandsire, Stedman Doubles, and Cambridge Minor. Kevin rang his first quarter on the treble, and Anne her first covering. Of our 'Learning the Ropes' ringers, four of them achieved level 1, two achieved level 2, and two achieved level 3 . Three members renewed their membership for the striking contests, and five more joined in November!

On 3rd June twelve of us rang for 70 minutes non-stop in relays, to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. We suffered the sad loss with the passing of Alan Furse in May. Together with his wife, Alan was a long-time member of the band. For many years, he was tower secretary and secretary of the Teignmouth Bells Project (TBP). Indeed, Alan was still in situ in the latter role at the time of his death. His passing meant that in a period of just over a year we had lost all three key members of the TBP (Martin Dodd, Chairman; Jean Wilson, Treasurer and Alan). We were therefore pleased to be able to ring a quarter-peal of Plain Bob Doubles on the back six at St. James in memory of all three of them the following Sunday by an all Teignmouth band. In addition, at the end of July, a memorial service was held for Alan, following which we able to ring a quarter of Alans favorite method-Grandsire Doubles with three covers.

Throughout the year, we have practiced weekly and been able to consistently provide Sunday service ringing at both St Michael and St James. In February, the times of the morning services at both churches were altered, the effect of which meant that we now had an hour to hang around between finishing at one \& starting at the other. It turned out that this had a couple of unforeseen benefits for the ringers. Firstly, the extra time has given us the opportunity to attempt a few quarter-peals at St James before service. Secondly, courtesy of the team, when not attempting a quarter, it's been back to their place for a bacon bap and a cuppa! Other social activities during the year have included an indoor BBQ in September and a Christmas meal, when 22 of us took over the Oyster Catcher in Teignmouth. We also had a very successful and well attended tower outing to the Exmoor in July.

At the start of the year we purchased a new set of muffles. This proved to be a prescient move. Following the announcement of the death of Queen on Sept 8th, eleven of us congregated at St Michael's that evening where we rang the Queens Peal fully muffled. The following day we tolled the tenor at both churches and subsequently rang for the announcement of the new King's succession and half-muffled on the day of the Queen's funeral. On Remembrance Sunday, we were able to ring at both churches half-muffled, thought to be the first time this has happened in over twenty years.

Earlier in the year we rang a quarter-peal of Plain Bob Doubles with three covers at St Michael's and the Queens Peal at St James as part of the celebrations for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. At Christmas, we could provide a band for all but one of the extra services, including this year on Christmas Day at St Michael's - the first time this has been possible for many years.Finally, we were delighted to be presented with the Edden Clapper trophy at the Mid-Devon Branch AGM in November.

Practices have been well attended and this has enabled us to ring all the Standard 8 surprise major methods apart from London during the year. The Sunday picture is less optimistic, and we often only manage six bells. The advent of our new parish priest is an ideal time to mount a recruitment drive. He has already instigated a program of repairs to the tower to try and reduce water ingress.

We rang for both the platinum jubilee and the death of Queen Elizabeth II. Un-fortunately, with

BAMPTON St. Michael and All Angels, 6 bells, tenor 14cwt, grid ref. SS957222, EX16 9QJ.
Sunday: 10:15am (except 4th). General ringing: Thursdays 7:30-9:00pm.
HUNTSHAM All saints, 8 bells, tenor 8cwt, grid ref. ST001204, EX16 7NA.
Sunday: 8:45am (4th only).
Ringing: Most ringing activities resumed in 2022 with bands ringing for nearly all services and weddings and a weekly practice held at Bampton. Training events were offered to 18 ringers from other towers from May. Demand for help with raising and lowering in peal is strong and was met with four extended practices. Plain Hunting sessions have been run for Feniton ringers. Regular weekly peal attempts at Huntsham resulted in 32 successful peals and one was rung at Bampton. The After School Bell Club has yet to restart, but two keen Year 7 pupils have been taught since the autumn.

People \& Recruitment: The ringers lost during the pandemic have yet to be replaced and this has meant that on occasions bands have been short or unavailable for a few events. Recruitment is therefore a priority. A successful tower open afternoon was held in September linked to Heritage Open Days and teddy bear parachuting from the top of Bampton tower on the August Bank Holiday. These events were good for public relations for the Centre but have not yet resulted in
new recruits. Mandy Burnett stepped down as a trustee and Chris Bolt and Mike Ward joined the trustee group.

Fundraising: Coffee mornings for TRC funds were held in February and October and a cream tea in the churchyard in August. A small regular income is received from Easyfundraising through online purchases made by members. Peal fees and donations have also raised significant income. As a result of all the fundraising, donations were made to support both churches and money invested for future major work on the bells.

We no longer run a practice night. We are hoping to start some social practising at times to suit those of us who are interested.

And the Bishop came to see us in the ringing room! We think this might have been the first time we had a Bishop in the tower since 1908. July saw us celebrate one of our band reaching the age of 90 and who is still ringing for services. He was joined in the celebrations by a Guild Vice President (age 94) and ringers from Culmstock and Clayhidon and our Rector. Then we had a variety of animals for our pet service all seemingly untroubled by the sound of the bells. SILVERTON St Mary's, 8 bells, tenor 16cwt, grid ref. SS956028, EX5 4HS.
Sunday: 9:00 for 9:30am (4th Sunday 9:30 for 10:00). Practice: Thursdays 7:45pm.
Ringing at Silverton resumed in May when covid restrictions were relaxed. Prior to May, ringing was limited to one person chiming bells before the Sunday zoom service! Since May, ringing for Sunday church services and weddings has been by roster following CCCBR coronavirus guidelines and to avoid too many persons being in the ringing chamber.

Sunday: 9:30am. Practice: Tuesday, muffled 6:30pm-7:15pm, open: 7:15pm-9;00pm.
In 2022 we were able to ring for every Sunday service and for some special events. Practices were held regularly along with tied bell practices for learners and additional mid-week bell handling sessions. We continue to host the branch Triples \& Major practice each month and are grateful to those attending which enable us to ring additional methods.

During 2022 we rang six Quarter Peals and hosted the Heritage Open day in September with 60 visitors. This proves to be a great PR event and occasionally produces new recruits. We have had several disruptions including a series of breaks ins, vandalism and police involvement, pastoral reorganisation, plus the treasurer and church wardens stepping down. We are still determined to keep our church open and operating. We held some ringing practices at Laira during 2022 and hosted a Branch Triples and Major training session. We look forward to hosting more events and welcoming visitors over the coming 12 months.

LIFTON ST Mary 8 bells, tenor 21cwt, grid ref. SX386850.
Sunday: 9:00am. Practice: Monday 7:30pm.
We continue to have a strong band of ringers being able to ring six bells most Sundays and sometimes eight bells on practice nights. Our numbers are regularly boosted by ringers from other towers.

We have gained two competent ringers who have relocated to West Devon and a new learner joined us earlier this year. We are pleased that we are able to support other towers by helping out for weddings and funerals. Although the tower has been predominantly call change ringing in recent years, we are currently working hard teaching Plain Bob Doubles to our inexperienced ringers in preparation for the King's Coronation in May 2023. All of this makes for busy practice nights which are followed by much needed refreshments afterwards in our local hostelry.

PLYMOUTH Emmanuel, Mannamead Road, 8 bells, tenor 19cwt, grid ref. SX487564. Sunday: 10:00am and by arrangement 6:00pm. Practice: Thursday 7:00pm-9:00pm.

2022 was much more of a return to normal, the tower Christmas Meal took place in February, as usual at the Hunting Lodge and was attended by over 20 of the regular attendees and partners. The ringing at practice sessions has seen good progress being made by all attendees, with the ringing ranging from rounds and plain hunt to some surprise and all sorts in between. Sunday morning service ringing has regularly been taking place and the Plymouth Youths have been making use of the evening service slot once a month.

Thanks must go to all who have been supporting the practice and the service ringing throughout the year.

Ringing levels have now just about returned to pre-pandemic levels and we were able to practice on most Mondays, with the help with visiting ringers from Plymouth and the surrounding area. On the ringing front, a peal was rung in January by South West Branch members. Also, there was an open practice on the day of the SW AGM. We only had one visiting band this year and only two weddings. Hopefully, numbers will pick up in 2023.

This year was a bitter sweet year; as we both commemorated the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum jubilee and her death, after 70 years of faithfully serving our Country and Commonwealth. We rang rounds for the State Funeral, and during that evening's practice a grand total of 14 different ringers rang on the muffled bells. PLYMOUTH The Minster Church of St. Andrew, Royal Parade, Plymouth, 10 bells, tenor 30cwt. Sunday: 9:00am. Practice: Tuesday 7:30pm.

Sunday service ringing has continued to be well supported over the year. We welcomed one recruit to our ranks in the autumn and look forward to her becoming a Guild member in the not-toodistant future. We were also joined by two new students who have began their university courses. Sadly, we said goodbye to one University student who graduated during the year \& wish him well for the future.

Practice night ringing has continued with our learners and those from other towers making good use of the experienced ringers. We welcome some South Hams ringers to our practices once a month. We would like to thank all those ringers from other towers who support the practices and Sunday service ringing. Seven quarter peals were rung during the year, including one from a visiting band. These enabled various ringers to gain experience both in some longer and steadier ringing as well as in the methods. A first of Stedman Doubles for one lady, a ringer from Plympton rang her first quarter peal and one ringer, from Emmanuel, rang her first on eight bells.

Following the demise of the late Queen, the tenor was tolled at 12:00 noon on the day after the announcement and also before the start of her funeral. The first event was live streamed on Facebook by the local paper, along with a broadcast by the BBC on the Sunday morning following her death. One of the quarter peals was for the proclamation of the King (immediately after the local announcement) and one was rung after the Queen's funeral. As we look forward to the new year, we hope our ringers and those visiting us on a regular basis continue with the development of their skills, one of the most important of which is accurate striking.

We usually have enough ringers on a Sunday to ring the front five, and often have six. Visitors help us out with Evensong. Our ages range from 19 to 70+, and we are trying hard to recruit new ringers. We are traditionally a call-change tower, but we're working on learning to do some method ringing. A few of us visit other local towers during the week for a 'method fix'. Equally, other ringers come to assist us at many of our practices. Two of us have done the ART Teachers' Course. Practices are a mix of doing the level three requirements for the Call Change Challenges, and trying some Kaleidoscope and plain hunt exercises. All our ringers are being encouraged to take part in calling the changes, from different bells. One of our ringers has recently rung in her first QP at a different local tower, and is being encouraged to complete the method ringers' level three.

Salcombe ringers have continued to ring the bells for Sunday services, weddings, funerals when requested and other special events.

In 2022 we had the highest ever number of weddings to ring for - at least one on most Saturdays between the beginning of May and mid-September. Many of these were the final post Covid 'catch up' weddings postponed from 2020/2021. We also rang the bells in accordance with national guidelines for the funeral of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

We continue to hold regular practices on Wednesday evenings which, thanks to the highly welcome support of experienced ringers from Tavistock, enable us to maintain a good standard of change ringing and call changes. Walkhampton tower problems have also been fortunate for us as three of their band have become regulars at our tower. We regularly ring Plain Bob Doubles, Grandsire Doubles and Plain Bob Minor. We hope to extend our repertoire during this coming year after attending the Branch training programme.

Regrettablyone band member, a stalwart at Sampford Spiney since the bells were rehung in 2008, has had to cease ringing due to health and mobility issues. She is sorely missed.

We are hoping to reinstate a regular 3pm Evensong Service on the first Sunday of the month, which will enable us to resume a regular Sunday ring.

We rang a half muffled quarter peal of Plain Bob Doubles as a token of respect to her late majesty Queen Elizabeth II following her death and we have welcomed several visiting bands during the year.

Royal events had most effect on our ringing this year. We rang on the day of the Accession of King Charles III but it took us three attempts to ring a peal for the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, having rung peals for each of her previous jubilees. Compensation for one of those losses was a quarter of Grandsire Triples on 28th May. We eventually succeeded, combined with celebration of the Accession of the new monarch, with a peal of Plain Bob Major on 19th November. Four members of the band were present or former Stoke ringers, and we are grateful as ever for the help of friends from neighbouring towers, including one, for whom it was her first on eight. We said a sad farewell to Yvonne Porter, who died aged 90 in October. 2022 has seen a return to normal ringing at St Mary's. The regular sound of the church bells continues to be much appreciated by our village and missed practices are normally commented upon. Weekly practice has been well attended by our five regular ringers and one improver. All Church services during the year were announced by 30 min ringing of rounds, call-changes and plain hunt (more complicated method is still beyond our grasp!). In addition, we rang for the Platinum Jubilee, the Queen's Passing and Funeral (fully-muffled of course), Armistice, Christmas and New Year. We are looking forward to ringing for two weddings at St Mary's in March and June. We joined forces with St Andrews (Bere Ferrers) for the Deanery Ringing Festival to ensure that we could ring all of the bells at the four towers visited on the day. We also hosted three visiting bands over the course of the year.

TAVISTOCK St Eustachius, 10 bells, tenor 24cwt, grid ref. SX481744.
Sunday: 9:00am. Practice: Tuesday 7:30pm.
Ringing slowly returned to 'normal' this year, thanks to more vaccinations and improved ventilation in the Tower. Along with the Sunday ringing and Tuesday practices we have rung for weddings, funerals and of course joyfully for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, sadly on the occasion of the Queen's death and then for the Proclamation of King Charles. Ringing has gradually returned to pre covid levels with Stedman Caters on Sunday morning and Cambridge Surprise Royal on practice night.

Tavistock has hosted several visiting bands and training sessions for SW Branch. We enjoyed an outing to East Devon and a lovely lunch together.

The Thursday 'Learner's practice', utilising the simulator, is doing well with learners coming for surrounding Towers as well as Tavistock, with some now ready to progress to Sunday ringing at various Towers. Following on from hosting a Taster session in December for the 'Ring for the King' there are a new set of learners. Various ringers at Tavistock continue to support local towers.

WALKHAMPTON St Mary V, 6 bells, tenor 7-3-12, grid ref. SX536701, PL20 6JY.
Ringing currently suspended due to water damage to ceiling of ringing chamber.
A year ago, things were looking up for the Walkhampton ringers. We had three keen learners on Wednesday evenings and help from other towers. We were able to host a Branch Practice in late February, ring on Easter Day with assistance from Sampford Spiney, and ring for a wedding in June with help from Whitchurch and Bere Ferrers. We also rang a bell 70 times to commemorate the Queen's jubilee. Then came an instruction to cease ringing.

Ever since the repointing in 2018, the ringers had been reporting excessive water ingress through the south wall of the tower. By January 2022, mushrooms were growing from the floor above the ringing chamber and a bells inspection in March confirmed that, although the bells were in good condition, the intermediate timbers showed signs of decay. Subsequent expert investigation revealed extensive rot in the ceiling of the ringing chamber and, in July, advice recommended that ringing should stop. One exception was made for the tolling of the tenor to mark the Queen's death.

Since then a core of ringers has been welcomed at Sampford Spiney's and Plymouth Emmanuel's practice evenings and we are very grateful for this support. The need for further repointing and the repair of the rotten timbers means that we are unlikely to return to ringing in the near future.

We hope that 2023 will see a boost in numbers of young ringers in the area owing to the 'Ring for the King' recruitment efforts. A number of members of The Modern Society of Plymouth Youths also plan to continue to support Devon Young Ringers at their monthly practices at Pinhoe.

## Peal Secretary's Report

The Guild rang 110 peals in 2022, of which 16 were on handbells. There was an overall increase of 40 on 2021, however, as 2022 was the first complete year since lockdown, it is difficult to compare with previous years. At the end of 2022 the Guild total stood at 7528.

Huntsham was the leading tower followed by Exeter St Mark and Wobbly Bobs Campanile. First peal on the bells was rung at Landkey and only the second at Teignmouth, St James, both for the platinum jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II.

Yorkshire S Major was the leading method followed by seven Surprise Minor and twenty-two Surprise Minor

Disappointingly there were no first pealers or firsts as Conductor. However there was good progress made by some younger ringers, including Elena Brake ringing her first peal of Minor inside and her first on eight. Mark Pring rang his first peals of Yorkshire and Lincolnshire Surprise Major, Steph Hills rang her first of Bristol S Maximus while there was a peal in the same method on handbells for Andrew Digby and Oliver Coldrick.

John Hill rang in a peal of Stedman Caters at Exeter St Mark for the platinum jubilee, thus becoming one of the few to ring a peal for the Coronation of HM Queen Elizabeth II and for all the jubilees. Roger King rang a peal of Yorkshire S Royal at his home tower, Withycombe Raleigh, to mark his 80th birthday.

Various milestones were reached during the year, including John Martin ringing his 2000th peal and Tim Bayton and Roger King ringing their 500th.

There were several noteworthy peals, some for the platinum jubilee, and one on the Minor ten at Exeter Cathedral with the bells fully muffled, with the Tenor open at backstroke, to mark the death of Queen Elizabeth II. Handbell peals of note included Bristol S Maximus by the Guild for the first time and sixty-four Spliced Treble Dodging Minor.
